**NEW BUILDINGS.**—Mr. Charles Edwards is putting up a story-and-a-half frame house, 21 x 31 feet, on Francis street west, between his father's residence and Dr. Graham's. **HAY WANTED.**—Up to the end of January the best timothy hay was selling at \$8 a ton, but a heavy snowstorm on February 2nd, and another a few days later, completely blockaded the roads, and for a long time—over a month, if we are not mistaken—not a single load of hay was brought in from the country. But the Syndicate had "stacks" of it in bales, which they sold first at \$13, and then at \$14, per ton, which proves the truth of the adage that "it's an ill wind that blows nobody any good." We are told that there is any quantity of hay in the country, but the supply brought into the village since the roads became good has not equalled the demand, and \$10 per ton is still being paid for the best. Now that seeding is over, and farmers have leisure, the supply will probably exceed the demand, in which event there will likely be a decrease in price.
