

The Shamrock football team played a game with the Balsam Grove team on Wednesday evening, the 18th inst., and the Shamrocks made two goals, while the Balsam Grove team did not score one. On Monday evening, the 23rd, the Shamrocks played a game with the Fenelon Falls team and were defeated by the latter team.

Mr. Thos. Dewell has finished Mr. Alex. McGee's new barn, except to put in some windows, but there is a lot of work to be done in the interior of the basement. The barn as it now stands is 76 x 115 feet, with a stone foundation under all. When the stables are completed Mr. McGee will be able to drive through his cattle stable from one end to the other with sleighs or trucks. It has been arranged to have a row of box stalls, each 14 feet square, on one side, and on the opposite side a row of cattle will stand. Alex. intends to have a complete system of waterworks. A cistern will be built that will hold about 10,000 pails of water. It will be 24 feet in length, 11 feet high and 16 feet wide, and it will be so arranged that the cattle and horses can drink at their will. Underground ventilation will be adopted in this mammoth stock barn. A large amount of cement will be used in the construction of the flooring and the cistern. When this work is all completed it will be a model stock barn, and the proprietor will have summer all winter. From the beginning of the work to the end there was no sleight of hand work about it. Mr. J. D. Ewert, of Lindsay, with a few assistants, did the mason work.
