Railway Collision.

A collision by which five men were more or less injured, two cars badly smashed and another two slightly damaged, took place about a mile north of Gelett station on the afternoon of the 26th ult. A train of five box-cars, chartered by the Chemical Co, stood on the track. One had been filled with cordwood, and eight men were in the other four, loading them, when the engine belonging to the train came around a curve. The air brakes were applied, but, (owing to a defective rail and the slipperiness of others from rain) they were not effective, and the engine struck the full car with great violence. Just before the collision, Mr. Thomas Hodgson, the company's agent, who was at the side of the track, called to the men to jump, and the four who did so escaped unhurt, but the four who remained in the cars were badly jammed and bruised by the wood being thrown upon them. Joseph Thorne and Finney, who were the worst hurt, were taken to their homes; Charles Wilson was less seriously injured; and Fred Wallace, of the Falls, who jumped from a car after the wood struck him, had only a bruise on his left cheek and a slight cut on the inside of his lip. Mark Porter was on top of one of the cars, and seeing that a collision was inevitable, he jumped thirty or forty feet down the embankment, and was rather badly hurt. Dr. Frost, of Kinmount, went up the line to attend to the men, one of whom came to the Falls and called upon Dr. Gould. As far as we can learn, no one was to blame for the accident.

Fenelon Council.

Council met pursuant to call of the reeve. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted on motion of Messrs. Palmer and Mark.
A communication was received from Mr. G. H. Hopkins re the Robinson road; also one from the county re the county assuming cost of bridge on Ops and Fenelon boundary. No further action was taken in reference to the Robinson road.
On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Cragg, Thomas Daniels was allowed to perform this year's statute labor opposite lot 15, con. 9.
Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Palmer, That John Day be authorized to expend \$10 on lot 13, concession 9.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Mark, seconded by Mr. Webster, That the clerk notify John Waldon to move his fence off the road on Ops and Fenelon boundary, opposite con. 2.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Mark, That a by-law be now introduced and read a first time, to authorize the reeve and treasurer to borrow \$400.—Carried.
The by-law was introduced and passed in the usual manner, Mr. Webster in the chair.
Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Mark, That the grader now purchased by this municipality be under the direction of the reeve or councillor of that division in which he resides, and he shall say where it is to be operated.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Cragg, That the treasurer be instructed to pay the Good Roads Machinery Co. \$225 for the grader purchased from that company.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Mark, That the uniform grade or width of the road be from 22 to 24 feet, according to requirement in different localities.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Mark, That Mary and Sarah McFadyen each receive \$5 from the poor rate.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Palmer, That the following bills be paid: Clerk, for postage and stationery from F. J. Kerr, \$1 27; Albert Hardy, filling washout on his beat, \$12; A. F. Cragg, for telephone expenses re grader, \$1; T. Parkin and R. C. Webster, for attending county council, each \$2; M. Maybee, for to-day's meeting in Orange hall, \$1; James Martin, oil for grader, 58 cents; D. Gillies, D. Sinclair and John Irwin, half day with team testing road grader, each \$1 25; John Irwin, cutting brush on his beat, \$1.—Carried.
The council then adjourned, so met at call of the reeve.

Verulam Council.

Council met as Court of Revision on Monday, in Bobcaygeon, Mr. John Lewis in the chair.
A few names were added for Manhood

Franchise, and the roll was then confirmed.
The reeve, J. D. Hunter Esq., then took the chair, and the council went into regular session.
Mr. P. Brick complained that the road ditch was not deep enough to carry the water off his field, and, on the motion of Messrs. Brooks and Devitt, the reeve and councillors Capstick and Lewis were appointed to investigate.
Shovelling snow during the winter having used so much statute labor, on motion of Messrs. Brooks and Brooks a special grant of \$50 was made to Commissioner Capstick, and on motion of Messrs. Brooks and Capstick a grant of \$20 was made to Wm. Elliott's division.
The moving of Mr. Pogue's fence, and T. Ball's request for a grant of \$25 to stone the road, were referred to the commissioners.
Mr. Peel applied for report of expense of burying his hired boy, who died on his way home from Lindsay, while intoxicated. The young fellow is said to have been about 19 years of age, and as Mr. Knight had taken an interest in the boy on a previous occasion, the clerk was instructed to make inquiries.

Portland Cement.

The Raven Lake Portland Cement Co. have issued their prospectus. The works are at Raven Lake, in the township of Boxley, in Victoria County, where the deposit of marl is located—354 acres of a depth of 20 feet, and of the highest quality. Besides the clay at the low price of 25c. per ton, to company have secured the Elliot Falls power. The directors know the holdings of the Company and are practical cement men. Mr. John Lupton, president of the Owen Sound Cement Co., besides Senator McHugh and Mr. J. H. Carnegie, M. P. P., are on the Board. Mr. G. A. Jordan is handling the stock for this county, and can furnish all information as to the advantages of buying stock. J. Walter Wells, analyst, Provincial Assay Office, Belleville, conducted by the Ontario Government, in his report, says: "This is a first class sample of marl for the manufacture of Portland cement. In fact, I have never seen any better in Ontario."
