A SHOWER OF ICE.—About 2.30 p. m. on Monday a shower of ice fell between Rettie's Station and Biddow, in the township of Somerville, and lasted for about five minutes. It was not ordinary hail, but pieces of ice of various shapes and sizes, some of the "chunks" being heavy enough to break down garden vegetables and to give horses such stinging blows that they galloped around the fields as if they had been struck with whips. Even hail in July is very unusual, but showers of genuine ice are of as rare occurrence as four-and-a-half ounce eggs.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.—During the storm on Saturday evening five sheep and two lambs were killed by lightning on Mr. William Martin's farm in Verulam. They were under a shed away from the main flock, and when found were huddled together and dead as the proverbial door-nail. There were terrible storms on both Friday and Saturday evenings, but we have heard of no other damage being done, though several persons were "shocked," and a farmer (whose name we forget) told somebody else, who told us, that, as he was driving along the road home, lightning tore a lot of splinters from a telegraph pole and threw them under his horse's feet.

EARLY CLOSING.—As there was an error in the early closing by law as pub-

lished in last week's Gazette, though the mistake was not ours, we have corrected it and given it another insertion. The time at which all shops, except restaurants, must close on the days specified is seven p. m., and we hope the law will be rigorously enforced. In old times agreements to close early were constantly being made only to be broken, and that is why the "Ontario Shop Regulations Act," making early closing compulsory, was passed. There is not the slightest necessity for keeping stores open later than 7 o'clock in the evening, and those who persist in doing so will have to suffer the consequences.

By-Law No. 414.
A By-law to Regulate the Closing of all classes of Shops except Restaurants within the Village of Fenelon Falls.

The Municipal Council of the Village of Fenelon Falls, under the powers conferred by "The Ontario Shop Regulations Act," enacts as follows:

1. All classes of shops, excepting only restaurants, within the Municipality of the Village of Fenelon Falls, shall, during the whole of every year, except the evening between the Eleventh day and the Twentieth day of December in each year and except Saturday evening in each week, and except the evenings immediately prior to public holidays, be closed at seven of the clock in the afternoon of each day, and shall remain closed thereafter until five o'clock in the forenoon of the next day.

2. All of said shops shall on Saturday evenings and on evenings prior to public holidays, be closed at half past ten o'clock in the afternoon of said days, and remain closed until five o'clock in the forenoon of the second next following day.

3. That any person who shall open any shop in contravention of this by-law, or who shall be guilty of any infraction of this by-law shall, on conviction thereof before the Police Magistrate or any Justice or Justices of the Peace for the County of Victoria having jurisdiction in the premises, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the convicting Magistrate, Justice or Justices, a penalty not less than One Dollar and not more than Five Dollars for each offence, together with costs of prosecution, should the convicting magistrate see fit to impose the same, and in default of payment thereof forthwith, it shall be and may be lawful for the convicting Magistrate, Justice or Justices or any one of them to issue a warrant under his hand and seal to levy the said penalty and costs, or costs only, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender or offenders, and in case of there being no sufficient distress found of which the said penalty and costs can be levied, it shall and may be lawful for the convicting Magistrate, Justice or Justices to commit the offender or offenders to the common goal of the County of Victoria, with or without hard labor, for any period not exceeding twenty-one days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid.

4. This by-law shall come into force and take effect on the Fourteenth day of July, A. D. 1902.

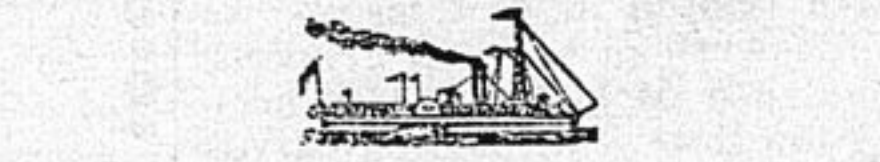

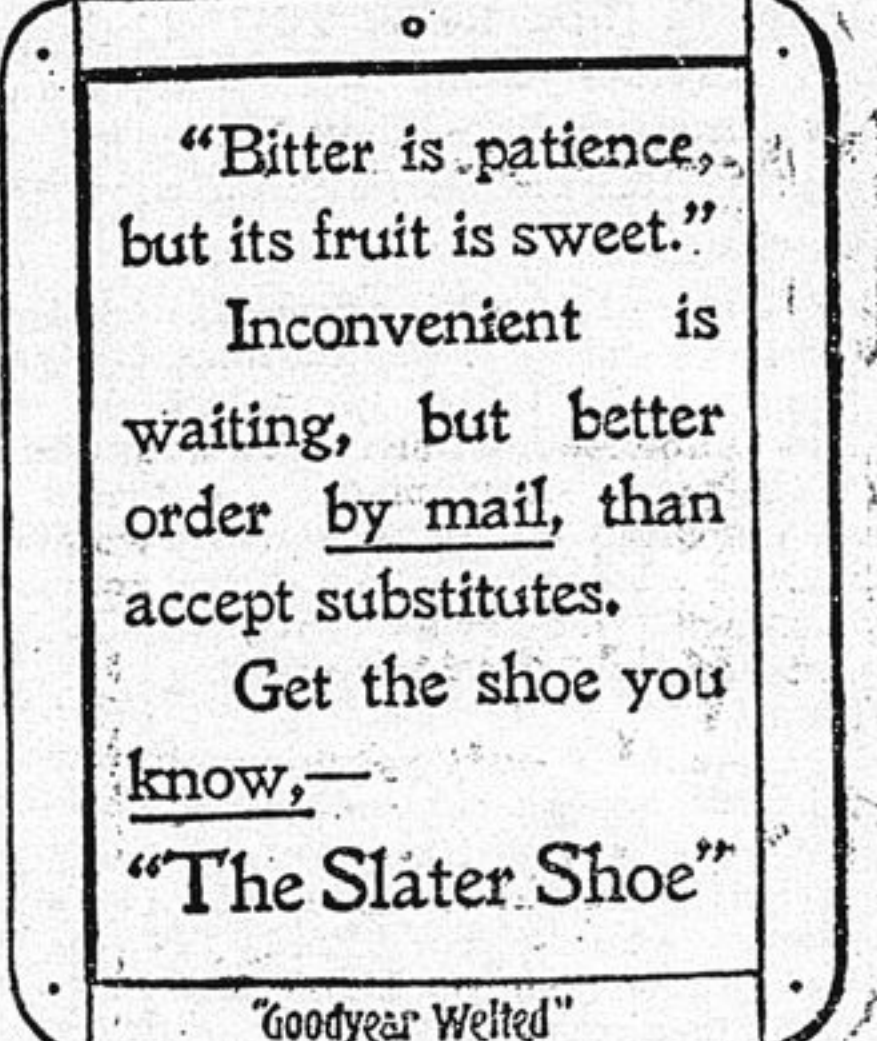
