**A Long Trip.**

Mr. William McArthur, who left on July 6th, with Col. Sam Hughes and two other gentlemen, for a trip through Manitoba and the North-west, returned home on Friday last, and since then has been too busy to give us the account of his journey which we hoped to obtain. The party remained about three weeks in Winnipeg, and then travelled about 1500 miles by rail through the great "wheat belt," and Mr. McArthur says that he never saw such crops of grain in his life. He bought two sections, or 1,280 acres, of farming and ranching land in the Saskatchewan district, considering it the best country in which a man can set foot. He met a great many persons whom he knew, some from this vicinity; but for five or six days they drove over a trackless prairie, seeing practically nobody. Col. Hughes performed this part of the journey on an Indian pony, which he bought at Edmonton, and sold again when he returned to that town. Our interview with Mr. McArthur lasted only about five minutes, but we hope to publish, in a future issue, a more extended account of his travels.

**Fenelon Council.**

Cambray, Aug. 28th, 1902. Council met at call of reeve. Minutes of last meeting read and approved on motion of Messrs. Palmer and Mark. Application for the position of collector was received from J. E. Fittal, who was appointed, on motion of Messrs. Webster and Mark, at a salary of \$70. On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Webster it was decided to levy a general township rate of \$1,900 and a poor rate of \$200. A by-law empowering the council to levy the different rates was introduced on motion of Messrs. Palmer and Cragg. By-law given its usual readings and signed and sealed. Moved by Mr. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Mark, That R. J. McLaughlin's bill of \$75 be paid from the incoming taxes.—Carried. By motion of Messrs. Webster and Mark, the reeve was empowered to employ a surveyor to locate the boundary line between Ops and Fenelon, along con. 2, Fenelon. On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Cragg, John Christian received a bonus of 15c. a rod for building 15 rods wire fence along the road at his lot; on motion of Messrs. Webster and Cragg S. McLean received 15c. a rod for 20 rods wire fence on con. 2 at lot 17, and on motion of Messrs. Palmer and Mark, Arthur Switzer received 15c. a rod bonus for building 20 rods wire fence along road at his lot. On motion of Messrs. Mark and Webster, council confirmed pay sent by the treasurer of a road grant of \$10 to Elijah Worsley. Mr. T. H. Rutherford was appointed commissioner to expend \$10 on his beat on motion of Messrs. Mark and Palmer. Mary and Sarah McFadyen were each given \$5 on motion of Messrs. Palmer and Cragg. On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Webster, it was decided to defer payment of D. Moynes' bill until some taxes are collected, owing to it exceeding the amount granted. Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Mark, That the following bills be paid: Geo. Sackett, 65 loads gravel,

\$3.25; Jas. Isaac, 45 loads gravel, \$2.25; John J. Smithson, 37 loads gravel, \$1.85; Neil Sinclair, 139 loads gravel, \$6.95; Walter Stevenson, for gravel, \$1.60; James Pollard, 40 loads gravel, \$2; John T. Palmer, part day's road work, 50c.; W. H. Powles, postage and stationery, \$5.26; Chas. Hore, for extra roadwork, \$7.50; John Day, culvert on con. 9, lot 11, \$4; Wm. Moynes, filling washout, \$5; Poulson & West, bolts for grader, 65c.; W. Harris, repairs to bridge on his beat, \$1.50; Clerk, express charges on voters' lists and grader lift arms, 65c.; R. C. Webster, work with grader, \$4.50; Clerk, half yearly report for B, M. and D., \$9.20; John Graham, extra work on Fenelon and Verulam boundary, \$5; Jas. P. Palmer, expense of grader work for 3½ days, \$35.80; Wm. Cooper, one day's work on road, \$1; D. Ferguson, working grader, \$9.75; John Cunningham, one day's work on his beat, \$1.25; Alex. McKenzie, cedar for culvert, \$1.25; H. F. Cragg, operating road grader, \$42; reeve, attending meeting re drainage, \$3; D. Clark, extra pay for pulling stumps, \$5, for washout \$3.50, culvert and gravelling lot 10, con. 2, \$9.50; W. B. Feir, Orange hall for meeting to date, \$2.—Carried. Council then adjourned to meet at the call of the reeve.

Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by Mr. Pearce, That Mr. Nevison be chairman *pro tem.*—Carried. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Special auditors' report laid on the table for Jan. 1st to Aug. 1st, 1902, as per motion of Aug. 12th. Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by Mr. Pearce, That the special report of the auditors from Jan. 1st to Aug. 1st, 1902, be received and adopted, and that the required number of copies be printed.—Carried. Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Deyman, That the chairman sign orders for the following accounts: Jos. Heard, account, \$76.45; F. Sandford, do., \$25.32; Rathbun Co., do., \$8.58; Kennedy & Davis, \$19.80; J. Quibell, carting, \$1.75; J. C. Fitzgerald and F. J. Kerr, auditors, each \$4; Chas. Ley, on account of work, \$20.—Carried.

**CHICKEN THIEVES.**—This is about the time the annual fall raid upon poultry houses commences, and on Sunday night some sneak thief visited Mr. Andrew Torrence's and stole six large and plump Plymouth Rock pullets, besides a large jar of preserved fruit, which latter was taken out of the root-house. The previous night one of Mr. Torrence's neighbors lost a bag of oats, and the lock on the henhouse door of another was tampered with, but resisted the attempts made upon it. It is a pity that some of the thieves cannot be caught in the act, and either arrested or treated to a dose of fine shot.

**MONEY IN CATTLE.**—On Tuesday last Mr. Joseph Handley, of Burnt River brought fifty-three young cattle, chiefly steers, to the Falls, and sold them to Mr. Davidson at four cents per pound, live weight, the price received for the lot being a little over \$2300. These are grand times for the farmers, especially for those who engage largely in stock raising, and all of them who have heads on their shoulders are making money. Eight carloads of cattle and sheep came from the north on Monday, and a resident of the Falls who was in Lindsay on Wednesday said that
