

**METHODIST ANNIVERSARY**—The anniversary services in connection with the Fenelon Falls Methodist church will be held this year on Sunday and Monday, October 12th and 13th. Rev. G. W. Henderson, of Cambridge St. Methodist church, Lindsay, will preach on Sunday at 10.30 a. m. and 7 p. m. Morning subject, "What the pew has a right to expect from the pulpit." Monday evening supper will be served in the basement of the church from 5 to 7.45 o'clock, after which the Rev. G. W. **THE "CORDUROY" ROAD**—At the meeting of the village council held on August 6th, Mr. Austin moved and Mr. McGee seconded, that \$25 be expended on Francis street east from John McKinnon's to Mrs. Taggart's house. The motion was carried without opposition, and the work in accordance with it has been commenced. The piece of road upon which improvements are being made is known as the "corduroy" or "sawdust" road, because at least half of the 200 yards more or less of its length is through a sort of swamp, and this part was built of logs, which were originally covered with sawdust from the mill, owned by the McArthurs, that stood nearly opposite Mrs. Taggart's. The logs have been removed and the ground being now a good deal drier than it originally was, a road of broken stone of considerable thickness is being made. When it is finished, waggons will be able to go that way to the houses beyond, and to Rathbun's camping place instead of around by the boundary, which will save a long distance every trip; and farmers who come to the Falls by that road during sleighing time, will no longer have to dodge in and out to avoid stumps and stones.
