His Little Game.

As an illustration of the saying that "when the cat's away the mice will play," Mr. J. Israel Tarte availed himself of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's absence from Canada to go up and down the country advocating a tariff policy differing from that of the Government of which he was a member. But the Premier is home again, and Mr. Tarte has resigned the position which was no longer tenable, his course having been "contrary to precedent, unconstitutional and in violation of the principle of fair play towards his leader and his colleagues." Years ago Mr. Tarte was a Conservative, and has probably returned to that party, who will welcome him with open arms; but how they will unseat all the hard things they have been saying about him is difficult to imagine. Of course Mr. Tarte has an object in suddenly changing—or pretending to change—his views on the tariff question, and Conservatives are already predicting that he will be the next Premier, which he is probably aiming at. That he can secure some sort of a following in Quebec is beyond a doubt, but his sudden and treacherous defection will probably injure Sir Wilfrid Laurier less in that province than it will benefit him in the others. Fair minded men do not like tricky ones; and, as the great majority of them are fair minded, very many of them who are not bound by strong party ties will probably support the present Premier simply for the purpose of defeating the little game which Mr. Tarte is generally believed to be trying to play.

Infringement of a Trade-mark.

In an action in the High Court of Justice for Ontario recently tried before Chancellor Boyd at Toronto, the Slater Shoe Co. and Chas. E. Slater, President, of Montreal, makers of the famous Slater shoe, obtained a judgment forever restraining F. C. Wilkinson, a boot and shoe dealer of Owen Sound; from advertising, offering, exposing for sale or selling boots or shoes not made by the Slater Shoe Co. as "Slater Shoes," "Slater Goods," or "The Slater Shoe." The Chancellor also ordered Wilkinson to pay the heavy costs of the action. It seems Wilkinson was offering for sale shoes made by a manufacturer in Montreal whose name was somewhat similar to the Slater Shoe Co. This maker came up from Montreal and gave evidence at the trial and appeared to be looking over the defence for Wilkinson; but the Chancellor, after hearing the evidence, decided that no one except the Slater Shoe Co. had the right to use the name "Slater Shoes," "Slater Goods," "The Slater Shoe," or any similar names in connection with boots and shoes, and that Wilkinson had no right to use any name or names in connection with boots and shoes which might enable him to pass off a shoe not of the Company's make as being of their make, nor in any way to reap the benefit of the reputation which the Slater Shoe has acquired throughout the Dominion of Canada.
