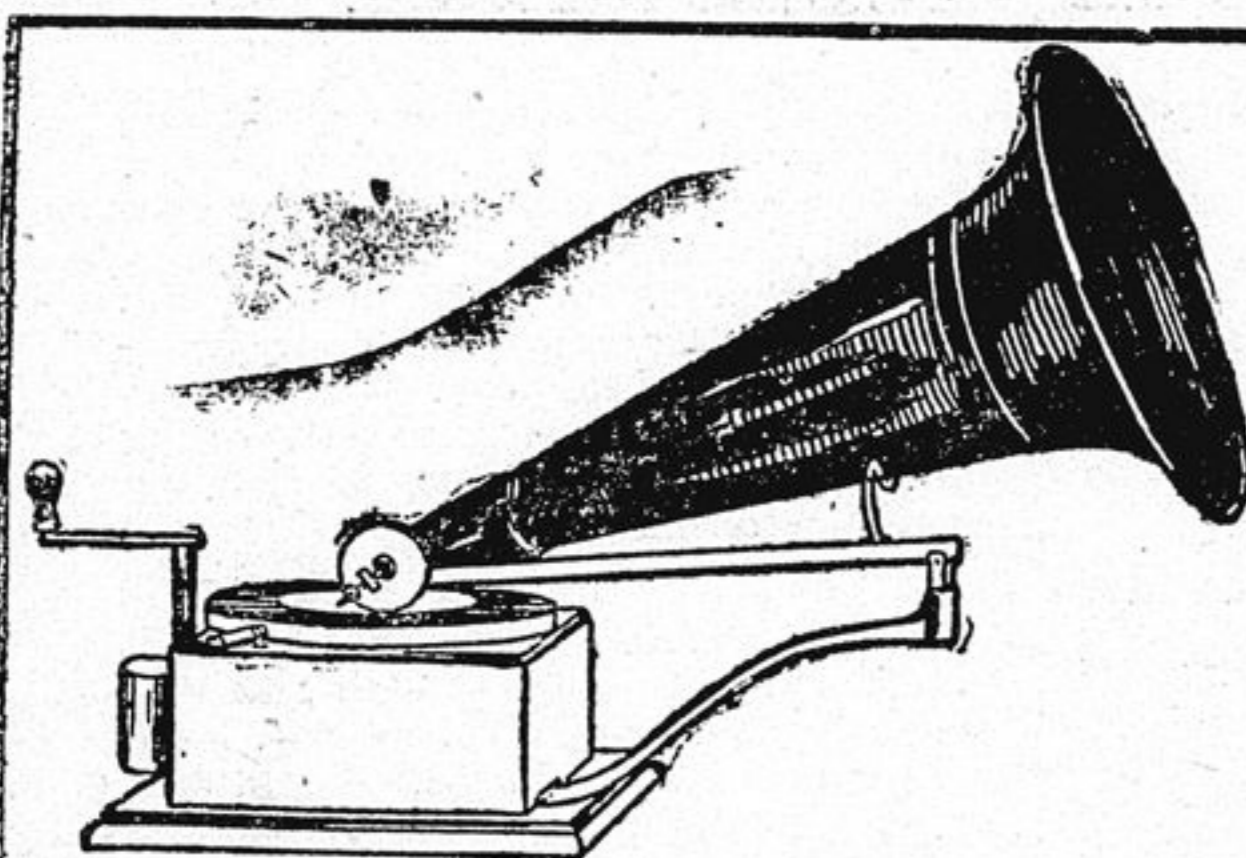

#### A Merry Christmas to You.

We wish all our readers a Merry Christmas, especially those who don't owe us anything, and those who do and will call in and pay up by the evening of the 24th.

#### The Best Result Was Obtained.

A weekly paper having complained because the Referendum vote was taken in December instead of on the day of the municipal elections, the Toronto Daily Star says:

"If the vote that was polled on December 4th had been polled on municipal election day, it would have been an easy thing for the liquor interests to rob the result of all significance. They would claim that men were drawn to the polls by the municipal elections, and that thousands therefore voted who would not walk across the road to either vote for or help in enforcing the Liquor Act. There is no chance for such talk now, and attempts to discredit the significance of the vote polled against the bar-rooms are bound to fail. The straight fact is that 170,838 electors went to the polls for the simple purpose, and no other, of voting for the Liquor Act. In the country the roads were bad, canvassing was difficult, the voter who did not want to vote had, in the condition of the roads, a fair excuse. In the cities men quit work, not to vote for a mayor or aldermen, but for the definite purpose of voting for this law. This is the most authoritative pronouncement against the liquor trade, as it is, that the temperance people of Ontario have ever procured. It cannot be talked away, as would have been the case had the poll been taken on election day. The bar-rooms, the treating and the promiscuous habits of the people were up for judgment, and in the whole Province only 90,310 persons came forward to drop secret ballots in defence of the liquor trade as it is. In some places it is more than likely that ballot boxes were stuffed, and that the vote, small as it is, was not honestly obtained. The strongest denunciation has thus been given of the liquor traffic as it is. It has few to defend it and many to denounce it, and the next duty of Government must be to thin out the bar-rooms, close up entirely those that are but saloons, and altogether to apply an advanced policy of restriction."

#### Runaway Accident.

On Friday last Mr. M. Boyd arrived at the Falls by the noon train, and took dinner at Brooks's hotel, where he awaited the arrival of his pony-sleigh from Bobcaygeon to take him home. The team, one of which was a colt, were driven by Mr. William Thurston, who has been in Messrs. Boyd's employ for some time, and he was accompanied by Miss Eva Bonnell. Just before the long bridge over the falls was reached, a few minutes before one o'clock, the spirited little horses took fright—though at what does not seem to be known—and tried to bolt; and when Mr. Thurston took a strong pull on the lines, which were of russet leather and old, one of them broke. The ponies sprang on to the bridge and started to run, and, when about half way across, their sleigh collided with Mr. Robert Magee's, knocking the rough box off a casket he was bringing from the station, and upsetting a barrel of fish. A little further on the sleigh struck the side of the bridge with such force that both the occupants were thrown out, and the double-tree was broken, which set the

runaways loose. Mr. Thurston escaped unhurt, but Miss Bonnell received so bad a gash on her forehead that Dr. Graham, to whose office she walked, declining a proffered seat in a cutter, had to put no fewer than seven stitches in the edges of the wound. The ponies were caught at Mr. Sadler's gate.
