Her Heroic Death.

A NURSE REFUSES TO LEAVE HER PA-TIENT IN A BURNING BUILDING.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Feb. 2. - The Deaconesses' Home, Jennings avenue, was burned yesterday. The fire started in the basement, and before it could be extinguished four of the fifteen patients in the house and hospital were dead and the building was almost entirely destroyed. Minnie Baumer, one of the nurses, appeared at the upstairs window and implored those below to assist her in getting out her patient, William Aylmer, one of the burned men. For a moment the brave woman stood lookin down into the crowd below her, and then duty triumphed over her desire to be saved. The smoke was pouring from the windows above her, and her white, startled face appeared as a picture in a frame of darkest ebony. Then she turned into the room and she was seen no more until her blackened form was carried tenderly from the building shortly after.

#### An Important Decision.

The Supreme Court of Belgium has just given judgment in a case involving the right of a husband's ownership of his wife's legs after amputation. A surgeon who had preserved the leg of a lady patient in a jar of spirits, labelled with her name and the particulars of the case, was sued by the husband for the return of the severed limb. The surgeon demurred, admitting that the plaintiff had proprietary rights in the leg while it formed part of his wife, but argued that the leg, in its present condition was the result of his (defendant's) skill and the work of his own hands, and that he was clearly entitled to keep it. The court heard long arguments pro and con, deliberated a fortnight, and ordered the delivery of the leg to the husband.

#### Jack Dempsey Insane.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—The last chapter in the eventful career of Jack Dempsey, the once invincible middleweight pugilist, has been reached. He is now a physical and mental wreck, though his friends are trying zealously to conceal his real condition. Dr. Ward, of Coney Island, states that the pugilist's mind is unbalanced, and he can only hope to revive his shattered faculties by good medical treatment and careful nursing. The physician states that Dempsey is likely to do himself irreparable injury if left alone. He defines the case as melancholia, superinduced by worriment and drink. Dempsey is now confined to the home of his brother Martin in Williamsburg.

#### A Murderous Assault Case.

OMEMEE, Ont., Jan. 2.—About five miles east of here last night Thomas Foster, who had been staying with his friend, Andrew Faulkner, lately, took up an iron poker and struck Wm. Faulkner over the head and laid him out. He then went at Andrew and laid his skull bare in four places and pounded away unmercifully at his arm and shoulder till life was almost extinct. Then be left the house. Faulkner's sister got word to another brother named Samuel, who procured medical aid and then he went to Lindsay and swore out a warrant. Foster was arrested by County Constable Short and taken to jail. Andrew Faulkner's condition is serious. Foster is now in Lindsay gaol awaiting his trial. He says the action was committed in self defence.

# Farm Products Under the Wilson

BUFFALO, Feb. 4 .- The customs receipts at the port of Buffalo for January, 1894, were but \$43,933; for January of this year they were \$63,396, an increase of \$19,462. In almost every instance where the duty has been diminished the importations have nearly doubled and in some cases they have increased to even a larger extent. This is especially true with Canadian barley and foreign fabries. Barley is now being shipped here in immense quantities. Other Canadian farm products since the new law went into effect have found a demand in Buffalo markets. Live stock, including sheep, lambs, cattle and some horses, contribute to the influx of taxable goods from across the border.
