Toronto's Third Fire.
\$750,000 GONE UP IN SMOKE.

TORONTO, March 4.—Toronto witnessed its third baptism of fire within eight weeks early on Sunday morning. Grand and awful as the two previous conflagrations seemed to those who saw them, they paled and faded away in comparison with that of Sunday morning. The fire broke out in the basement of Simpson's mammoth new seven-story dry goods warehouse at Yonge and Queen-streets, and before it could be got under control these buildings were destroyed, most of them complete losses: R. Simpson, building and stock; P. Jamieson, clothing; Agriculture and Arts Association, building and fixtures; Jones Estate, Sutcliffe building; Sutcliffe & Sons, dry goods; J. Mannell, stores and Tremont House; Dunfield & Co., gents' furnishings; C. F. Adams, house furnishings; Imperial Bank, building and fixtures; J. Milne & Co., house furnishings; J. Bonner, gents' furnishings; Canadian Umbrella Co.; Miss M. E. Brisley, Henderson Block; Knox Church; Hardy Block; T. Eaton Co., damage very slight; R. H. Gray, Queen street, Sutcliffe building. Other losses \$10,000.

Total loss \$679,000; total insurance \$540,000.

Fire of Jan. 6.—Globe and McKinnon building, loss \$694,200, insurance \$478,150.

Jan. 10.—Osgoodby and Wellington-street fire, loss \$672,950, insurance \$479,200.

Total loss in the three fires, \$2,046,150, insurance \$1,478,650.

Murder For Robbery.

VALLEYFIELD, Que., March 2nd.—Paymaster Job Lawe of the Montreal Cotton Co. with two assistants, J. Lay and Hugh Wilson, was making up the employees' pay last night, when Mr. Shortis, lately private secretary to the manager of the mill, entered the office and, picking up Mr. Lawe's revolver, shot Wilson in the side and then fired at Lay, killing him instantly. Lawe, seeing the murderer's object, caught up the pay boxes and ran into the vault, pulling the door after him. Maxime Lebaeuf the night watchman coming in at this juncture, Shortis shot him dead. He then attempted to enter the vault, and while thus engaged a couple of mill firemen rushed in and overpowered him. Wilson is in a critical condition. Lawe, who had been ill recently is also in a weak state.

There was something over twenty thousand dollars in the office of the Montreal Cotton Company, which he hoped to secure, but was balked in the attempt by the brainy action of Mr. Lawe in using Shortis as an instrument to securing the money, by turning the lock on the door of the vault. Shortis is an Englishman; he had been here for five or six months and was discharged about six weeks ago. He was somewhat of a sport and indulged a good deal in the drinking habit, which is held to be primarily responsible for the present contretemps.

Ontario Should Follow Suit.

The Manitoba Legislature on Friday gave notice that it will cut off the supplies for the residence of the Lieutenant-Governor in that Province at the end of this year. The move is a wise one. One of the most grotesque of the many follies in connection with our system of government is the price we pay for mere ornamentation. We allow the Governor-General double the salary that is paid the President of the United States. We pay the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario \$2,000 more than is paid the Governor of Ohio, \$4,000 more than is allowed the Governor of Illinois, \$5,000 above the remuneration granted the Governor of Massachusetts or Indiana and \$9,000 in excess of the allowance of the Governor of Michigan. And, unless we are mistaken, in no case is there an official residence provided for the head of a State Government across the line. We cannot too soon get rid of the governmental trills that absorb so many of the hard-earned dollars of the Canadian taxpayer, and the first step in this Province should be in the form of an immediate start in the direction pointed out by Manitoba.—News.

Louise Michel, the little Anarchist agitator, has been very ill for several days, and is not expected to recover.
