HOT ASHES.—As Mr. Stephen Nevison was on his way from his residence on Colborne street to his stable on Francis street east about 4 o'clock on Tuesday morning, having to leave very early for the country, he saw smoke coming from the open doorway of a small shed behind Twomey's brick block, and found that an old barrel had caught fire from some hot ashes that had been dumped upon some cold ones with which it was nearly filled. It appears that a boy employed in the hotel had taken the ashes from a stove during the afternoon and put them in an iron pan outside to get cold, and that some time afterwards another employee, wanting the pan, had thrown the ashes into the barrel under the impression that there was no fire in them. Fortunately no harm was done, but if Mr. Nevison had not happened along when he did, the shed would soon have been in flames, and the large hotel stable and other wooden outbuildings are very near to it.

TO THE ELECTORS —OF— NORTH VICTORIA.

GENTLEMEN:

Having accepted the nomination of the Liberal Convention of North Victoria, as a candidate for the House of Commons, I desire to place before you my views of some of the chief political issues that are before the people.

1. I adhere generally to the platform of the Liberal party and also to the platform of the Patrons. Both platforms are the same in principle; tariff reform, economy and honesty of administration being the principles that underlie both. With this statement as to my general views, I claim freedom of action and the right to put what I may believe to be for the best interests of the country, before any party consideration.

2. As to the question of the abolition and reform of the Senate, I agree with the Patron view that it should be abolished; and I think its abolition should be but a part of a general scheme for the abolition of much else that is expensive and worthless in connection with our political system, and a general decrease in officialism. I believe that the Government of the country should be an institution for doing the business of the public in as economical and efficient a way and with as little red tape and formalism as possible.

3. I believe in these days, when land was never so productive and labor never so efficient, that hard times and depressions are not necessities, but are the direct result of what is wrong in our political and social systems, and while I do not pretend that a change of government will effect everything, I believe it is in the Government where renovation should be commenced and where it will be most effective.

4. I believe that the corruption which has existed to such an extent in the various departments of the Government as shown by the Records, and which has spread through the Municipalities and into private life throughout the country, is the potent cause of many of the ills from which the country is suffering. That the morals of any people are the very foundation of their material progress, and that the disregard of common principles of business honesty makes satisfactory progress of any kind impossible.

5. Monopolies of all kinds should be discouraged. So soon as any business or trade becomes a monopoly, and the ordinary principles of supply and demand and competition do not operate, then it should be controlled by the Government, and this is especially the case in this country with the carrying trade.

6. I object to the granting of public money to private speculators; and believe that railroads and other works that may hereafter be built by public money should be public property, controlled in the interests of the public. I am also in favor of such railway legislation as would make the railways of the country public highways, bound to carry the goods of every man at reasonable and similar rates, and that they should have no power to discriminate either against individuals or places.

7. I deprecate with all my heart the system of bribery and corruption which has been growing in this country, and which has even reached so far that it has been publicly stated in this constituency that a man will not even get a day's labor on public works except he supports the Government candidate. I shall never be a party to so unworthy a policy as would deprive a poor man of a day's work, or his family of a day's bread, on account of his politics.

8. Public works that have been undertaken by the Government should be prosecuted in a businesslike manner, and not periodically resurrected at an election time for the sole purpose of corrupting the electorate.

I believe the carrying out of the principles as above outlined, to be for the best interests of all classes of people, and, if elected, I pledge myself to devote my energies to bringing about reforms as indicated; and I confidently ask the support of all parties, irrespective of politics, who desire better things for our common country.
