Married by a Woman.

MRS. BALLINGTON BOOTH OFFICIATES AT THE CEREMONY.

CINCINNATI, March 23.-What is said to be the first wedding in which the officiating minister was a woman occurred here Thursday night. Mrs. General Ballington Booth, of the Salvation Army, was the minister. The bride and bridegroom were Lieutenant Alice Talbott, of Cleveland, and Adjutant Joseph Hargreaves, of Cincinnati, both of the Salvation Army. The Salvation Army temple was crowded, though the admission fee was fifty cents. There were no flowers except a white rose worn by the bride, whose dress was the conventional army black, relieved by a white silk sash. The bridegroom wore his uniform. Both were ungloved. A supper and march to the temple preceded the ceremony, which lasted over two hours. There were no special decorations in the hall. "The pair," said Mrs. Ballington Booth, "were to be married under the flag of the Army and of the nation." There were preliminaries of prayer, singing, clapping of hands, waving handkerchiefs and shouting hallelujah in concert. Mrs. Booth said the rule of the Army was to avoid all ostentation. An inviolable condition of the marriage was that it must not interfere with the duties of either as soldiers in the Army, and that each must second and support the other as soldiers of the Army. After this the pair stepped to the front, each with an attendant. Mrs. Booth stood between them. Each separately repeated after Mrs. Booth their acceptance of the conditions. Then hands were joined, and the rest of the ceremony performed, including the placing of the ring and pronouncing them man and wife. The bride and bridegroom each delivered addresses. Mrs. Booth closed with an address.

#### Destroyed Derelicts.

NEW YORK, March 23 .- The dynamite pneumatic gunboat Vesuvius, Lieut. Commander Harry Knox commanding, returned to the Navy Yard yesterday afternoon from a cruise in search of dangerous floating wrecks. The Vesuvius succeeded in finding the wreck of the schooner Josie Reeves floating about six miles off shore, between Shinnecock and Fire Island, and yesterday it was destroyed with gun cotton, which was lowered into her and exploded by electricity.

The Vesuvius then went to a point off Barnegat and began the destruction of a submerged three-masted schooner. which is lying in fifteen fathoms of water. Her rigging was broken up and her mainmast was shattered, but the weather was so rough that the completion of the work was postponed until m re favorable weather sets in. It is customary to leave at least ten fathoms of water above each wreck that is destroyed. At this season of the year, Lieutenant Commander Knox says, there are not more than four days out of every ten that are favorable outside for the work of destroying wrecks, as it is so rough that the little boat cannot work alongside without danger.

### Poisoned Sugar.

PHILADELPHIA, March 23 .- Nearly a million pounds of beet root sugar, mingled with which there is a quantity of arsenic, said to be sufficient to poison the entire population of Philadelphia, are to be sold to satisfy the government. The sale is to take place on Friday morning at a bonded warehouse, where the sugar, part of the cargo of the German steamer Remus, is stored. No mention is made of the fact that the sugar to be sold is mixed with arsenic, but an analysis shows the presence of a large quantity of the drug. The cargo, which has been abandoned to the government, was damaged in transit across the Atlantic and got mixed with arsenic in the ship's hold.

A white rainbow was seen recently at Westnewton, Aspatria, in Cumberland, during a hard frost. It lasted for more than half an hour, a d was much broad-

er than the ordinary rainbow. An eighteen-months'-old child of William Gee, a farmer, fell feet first into a ten inch bored well, which had been completed to a depth of 20 feet, and lodged upon the boring machinery. It remained there 23 hours while the neighbors were digging and tunuelling to get it out. It will recover,
