HEREFORD CATTLE.—A drove of cattle consisting of about a dozen cows and heifers and half as many calves passed through the village last Saturday on their way from the railway station to Mr. Boyd's farm at Bobaygeon. PULLED DOWN.—The dilapidated old driving shed, with hall above, at the rear of the Clifton House, was pulled down this week. Mr. J. J. Wilson having bought it with the intention of converting it into a barn. The price paid was \$20, and as the building measured 30 x 50 feet and the heavy square timber and the rafters are perfectly sound, Mr. Wilson got a good bargain, especially as he will not have to draw the materials much over a mile.

A LONG WINTER.—The winter just drawing to a close has been a long one, in consequence, as everybody knows, of the bear having seen his shadow on Candlemas day. This time last week the sleighing was breaking up so rapidly that even then the village roads were almost bare; but since then we have had two or three cold nights and more snow, and this (Thursday) morning there is good sleighing again, but it can't last long, as the sun is getting very strong.

"Howry" ITEMS.—Last week we noticed that the machines required in the playing mill and box factory had arrived and been set up, and since then two car-loads of castings for the mill and one of wheels and axles for the yard trucks have been received. The trucks, fifty in number, are now being built, and two more car-loads of wheels and axles will be required, and are expected to be here this week. The brick for the boiler house arrived on Tuesday, track-laying is progressing steadily, and men are blasting the rock at the north side of the box factory, where six turntables, each just large enough to take a truck, are to be located.

Dinah Salifou, the Senegalese monarch who was one of the human curiosities of the late Paris exhibition, is petitioning for an increase of the allowance of \$20 a month accorded to him by the French Government after he was deposed.

John Bell and Sarah Swallow, the latter a widow, were found dead in bed in Toronto, with their throats cut, on Sunday morning. The couple had been living together for some time. Bell had evidently murdered Swallow and then committed suicide.

At Norwalk, Conn., Mrs. Peter McCuskey celebrated the 105th anniversary of her birthday. With the exception of sight, she possesses all her faculties.

The sufferers by an accident on the Intercolonial near Levis, Que., four years ago, have been granted \$12,000 by an order in Council. Thirty-seven claimants will divide the grant.

The Newfoundland Government, it is stated, is daily holding caucuses for the purpose of considering a plan of confederation with Canada. There is considerable opposition among the party to confederation, but it is expected that a delegation will arrive by the next steamer to solicit terms from the Dominion.

A special to the *Minneapolis Minn., Tribune* from Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, says: A horrible discovery was made to-day by a party of men hunting in the neighborhood of Ingram. The dead bodies of Ed. Duffney, James Hunson and another man were found in an old lumber shanty. From all appearances they had been dead a number of days, and the bodies were frozen stiff. Duffney and Hunson were formerly employed as woodsmen, but quit work to hunt wolves, using poison to kill them. The supposition is that in preparing supper they accidentally got the poison mixed with their food. Their dog was found dead in the same room.
