Mrs. Brien left on Monday for Toronto, but is expected back to-day or to-morrow, and will probably remain for some weeks. THE COW BY-LAW.—There was a much larger attendance than usual at the council meeting last Monday night, from which we infer that a good many opponents to the cow by-law were present. If so, they had their trip to the hall for nothing, as Councillor Martin was from home, and we understand that it was not thought advisable to introduce the unpopular measure until all the members were present.

ADJOURNED AGAIN.—The Fenelon Falls electric light suit was up for hearing in chambers on Tuesday last, and Councillor Slater, who is bound to see it through, went up to Lindsay with the book in which the proceedings of the council are recorded; but the suit, though on a light matter, is too important to be lightly disposed of, and, after considerable evidence had been taken and talk indulged in, an adjournment until Monday next was announced.

PROVED AN ALIBI.—Joseph Scott, the young man arrested on the 18th ult. on the charge of having robbed a farmer named Alldred near Kinmount of 25 cents on the Queen's highway, and who was released on bail, appeared before Police Magistrate Deacon at Lindsay on Friday last, and proved an alibi; two witnesses swearing that he was at Scott's hotel, Minden, until 10 o'clock on the night of the robbery, and another witness, who boards with Scott, swearing that he reached home, two miles from the village, with his team, at half past 10, and he was accordingly acquitted.

THE STATION.—For some days past the Grand Trunk Railway Company's carpenters have been at work at the station building, which is being covered with what is called "shiplapping," and the floors of which have been laid with narrow tongued and grooved maple. The flooring has been thoroughly oiled, and the outside when finished (and perhaps the inside) will be painted the orthodox G. T. R. colors. Even the railway company feels the impetus imparted to the village by the presence of the Howrys, and lo! a little money is spent in rejuvenating their premises.

CATTLE KILLED.—Last Saturday afternoon five young cattle owned by Mr. John Fell, Jr., of Somerville, got onto the railway track, which passes through the farm, and were run into by the northward-bound train, which killed two on the spot, and wounded the other three—one of them so badly that it may not recover. The accident happened in consequence of Mr. Fell forgetting to put up a set of bars that he had let down, and he is exceedingly glad that neither the engine nor either of the cars was derailed. As he is in good circumstances the money loss is of small consequence to him.

HOLSTEIN CATTLE.—By Tuesday's train there arrived at the Falls one bull, three cows and a calf about six months old, thorough-bred Holsteins, from Smith Bros.' stock farm at Churchville, Ont. The bull, one of the cows and the calf were for Mr. John Kelly, two of the cows for Mr. James Bick and one for Mr. James Martin, all of the township of Verulam. The prices of the animals, excluding the calf, ranged from \$75 to \$100, and they were all quite young. The Holsteins seem to be gaining considerable popularity, and a few of them were brought into this locality so long ago that black and white cattle are often seen in the droves that pass through the village on their way to the railway station.
