He had six new teeth, which appeared after he was 70 years old.

He has lived under all the presidents of the United States, has been a republican from the beginning of the party's existence, and took an active part in the "underground railroad."

During the evening Mr. Cooper expressed sympathy for his neighbor's loss, he (Mr. Moffatt) having had a fat beef sick from, it was supposed, an overfeed. Now, it is fair to the several men who also were sent for to assist in the slaughter that they did not dream of the beef being sold. The next day as I was in the village I saw Mr. Moffatt with beef for sale, and, remembering the story of the evening before, I remarked to a bystander, "I wonder if that is the beef that I heard my brother-in-law speak of being sick the day before." I appeal to you, Mr. Editor, is it right that I shall be accused of slandering? I ask, if the beef was fit for food why did not one of our village butchers buy it and give the poor people of the town the benefit of cheap beef? They are judges of beef, and honorable men, and no doubt considered the meat dear at any price, as it may yet prove to Mr. Moffatt, as it is rumored, and not without a glow of truth, that the beef was dead when a neighbor, who was sent for, could get a knife in its throat.
