The gate was off its hinges, and on the previous evening had been stood up so nearly perpendicular by a person who had occasion to drive into the lot that it toppled over when the little fellow tried to climb it. Mr. McLeod released him and carried him over to his father's house, almost directly opposite and Dr. Wilson, who was at once sent for, administered chloroform and set the fractures, and the little patient is, we are glad to hear, doing remarkably well.

MILL ACCIDENTS.—Yesterday (Thursday) morning two accidents happened to employees in Howry & Sons' sawmill, though, fortunately, neither of them was as serious as mill accidents too frequently are. At 7.30 o'clock, while Mr. Chas. Milne was working at the bolter saw, a piece of wood about eight inches long and an inch and a half thick got caught in the teeth of the saw and was thrown back, striking him above and a little to the left of his left eye and inflicting a three-cornered wound, into the edges of which Dr. Graham had to put no fewer than ten stitches. The cut was down to the bone, which fortunately escaped injury, and the doctor thinks his patient will be able to go to work in a few days, and that there will not be much of a scar. A couple of hours later Mr. Matthew John Wilson, son of Mr. J. J. Wilson, of Fenelon, had about half an inch taken off the tip of the second finger of his left hand in consequence of one of his feet slipping on a piece of bark while he was in the act of feeding a bolt to one of the horizontal shingle saws up-stairs in the mill. He went at once to his namesake, Dr. Wilson, who dressed and bandaged the hurt, which will probably take some little time to heal, as fully half the finger nail is gone.

The sulky was badly demoralized and the colt was slightly cut on the inside of his right front foot.
