THE BLYTHE FIRE.—Mr. John Graham of Blythe called in on Monday to correct some misstatements made in the account in last week's *Gazette* of the fire on his farm on the night of the 1st inst. The property destroyed (exclusive of the building) consisted of two sets of sleighs, two sets of wooden harrows, a roller, a new wagon-rack, about 3,000 feet of dry lumber and various small articles, and there was no insurance whatever. The building was originally a large boarding-house, and was put up nearly or quite half a century ago by the late John Langton; but as Rev. Mr. Boyd, a Baptist minister, frequently preached in it some years later, a resident of the township believed, and told us, that it was built for a church.
