He says that he blacked George Washington's boots and lighted his cigars. For a man one hundred and thirty-one years of age, Brown is pretty well preserved, especially in his imaginative faculties.

A son of Gehemrath Julius Schwabach, a member of the firm of Bleichroeder, of Berlin, has shown himself a phenomenal spendthrift. Within eighteen months he squandered over \$250,-000. While residing at Leipsic, Germany, he sometimes telegraphed to his tailor at Berlin to come to him by special train to take an order. He is now under guardianship.

Clifford Calverly, a wire walker, fell from a wire at Pleasure Beach, Conn., recently. He dropped fifty feet, but struck on his right hip in sandy soil, and was not fatally hurt. His hip and shoulder were bruised, and his right eye blackened from hitting a hook on a pole. He ascribed his fall to perspiration on his hands: He fell at Trenton two years ago and nearly lost his life.

A little boy two years of age, son of Mr. Martin Negal, who lives near Rain ham Centre, Ont., was in the field playing near where his father was cutting corn with a binder. He hid in the corn and his father came upon him unnoticed, and before he saw him the knife of the machine struck him, cutting off both legs. The child died from loss of blood before medical aid could be summoned.

A remarkable family of big boys met at their old home in Tionesta, Pa., a few days ago, after many years of separation. The shortest of the young men is just six feet tall in his stocking feet. Two of the brothers are six feet five inches tall, two others six feet three inches, and the remaining one six feet two inches. The father and mother of the boys, Mr. and Mrs. Harmon Coleman, are of only average height.

The young Egyptian Khedive is said to possess the most costly set of harness in the world. It is made of black leather, with chased gold buckles, and collars ornamented with the same metal. The pad cloths are also embroidered with 343,468 gold, and the set is said to have cost \$11,000. It is for four horses, and is used on all state occasions. Queen Victoria comes a good second. Her state harness, made many years ago, for eight horses, cost \$20,000. It is made of russet leather, elaborately stitched with so wide, and the mountings so heavy, about 200 lbs.

A Cyclone at Kingston.

\$100,000 DAMAGE IN 30 MINUTES.

KINGSTON, ONT., Sept. 13 .- A cyclone and electric storm on Wednesday did much damage here. Hundreds of trees were leveled, chimneys knocked down, windows smashed, and telephone and telegraph wires torn from their fastenings. The storm began at 9 o'clock and lasted half an hour. T. Clyde's house in Jenkins-street, newly built and occupied, was demolished and one lady was slightly injured.

The car-works' buildings were much shattered, while cars were wrecked. The loss is \$10,000. The cotton mill is badly damaged, and the repairs will cost \$70,000. Twenty-five hundred feet of roof was doubled over. The roof The peach crop in Michigan is un- then crashed into the mill, wrecking six mules and 3,600 spindles. The water pipes burst, flooding the mill. For some weeks over 200 employees will be out of work. Scores of barns and houses in the country were unroofed, while walks, trees, fences and out-buildings, both in city and country, were ripped up, and the various parts scattered for yards around. Many of the streets were blocked up with fallen trees.

The Kingston Field Battery, camped on Barriefield Common, received the force of the cyclone. One marquee and five tents were totally destroyed and 13 tents were damaged. The harness and equipments were blown all over the camp, and two limbers were blown from the middle of the commons clear across to the military college fences. Forty of the men were marched to " A " Battery barracks, where they were quartered for the night. Possibly \$100,000 will cover the damage in this section.

## Japan Playing at War.

The very playthings of Japan have now a warlike character, says a recent newspaper from that country. Chess is a favorite amusement of the Mikado's subjects, and the shapes of the pieces have all been changed of late to meet the popular taste, the pawns being made to represent Japanese and Chinese soldiers, and the bishops, knights androoks the officers of higher rank. The market is also being flooded with a great variety of mechanical toys, of tin or wood, which, by turning a crank or by simple clockwork, are made to show Chinese soldiers in various unenviable positions. Some of them represent the Celestials pursued by Japanese troopers, who make terriffic sweeps with sword or lance in a stately seesaw; others show prisoners caught by their queues, and trying to avoid the rising and falling blades. A favorite paper-weight or desk ornament is a clay figure of a Chinaman pleading for mercy. The most ambitious bit of mechanism represents a Japanese war vessel gradually closing with a Chinese ship. The latter is struck, its flag comes down with a rush, and the doomed vessel sinks beneath the turbulent tin waves.

## An Eventful August 16th.

A strange coincidence in dates was presented to Officer Stible, of the Central Station, on August 16th, when he returned to Mrs. Simon Buschkin, of No. 482 State street, a watch which had been stolen from her exactly one year before. Not only will August 16th be memorable to her on this account, but the same watch was presented to her as a gift by her mother exactly one year before it was stolen, and two years before it was returned.

"This is my watch," she said, "but it has had a strange experience. My mother went to Europe on August 16th, 1893, and just before leaving she gave me this watch. August 16th, 1894, burglars entered our house and robbed us of about \$200 worth of property. Among the goods taken was this watch. This is August 16th, 1895, and you return it to me."-Chicago Inter Ocean.
