A private belonging to a regiment of Highlanders lately rode through the streets of Glasgow on a donkey. He was arrested and fined 3 pounds 3 shillings, or one month's imprisonment, for attaching ridicule to the Queen's uniform.

The six-ton steel door of the Indiana National Bank's money vault at Indianapolis was opened last Friday morning. The contents of the vault, \$2,000,000 in currency, were found to be intact, and the interior was not damaged by the fire which destroyed the building.

A despatch from Havana to the *Imparcial* says that divers have refused to examine the wreck of the sunken warship Sanchez Barcayezegui, owing to the large number of sharks that infest the harbor, particularly in the vicinity of the entrance to the harbor where the warship went down.

At Chicago the intense heat of last week caused one or more deaths and many prostrations daily, but Friday's eclipse killed all others. For the 24 hours ending at 8 o'clock on Friday night the death roll numbered 51—47 of the number, however, being children under five. The thermometer has hovered around the 91 mark for a week, and the excessive humidity has made the heat all the more unbearable.
