Haliburton at a salary of \$800. The appointment is a good one, as Mr. Fielding possesses all the qualifications for the onerous and trying position, one of the chief of which is that he is a man who will, we feel sure, temper justice with mercy, and will not allow his private feelings to influence his convictions. (We hope no one will suspect us of having used the words "trying" and "convictions" in a punning sense, as such was not our intention.) Mr. Fielding is succeeded at Crown lands agent by Mr. Wm. Hartle, also of Minden, who, as an old resident of the district and a farmer, ought to be, and no doubt is, exceedingly well fitted for the position.

IN A WELL .- On Friday of last week a colt coming three years old, owned by Mr. Levi Wager of Fenelon, stepped onto and broke through the platform over a well, which is stoned up, is about twelve feet deep and has about two feet of water in it. It is not known how long he had been, like Truth, at the bottom of the well, but when found he was patiently standing up on all four of his feet, with his body somewhat bent to suit the shape of the enclosure. Several neighbors were called together and dug a trench four or five feet deep to the side of the well and removed some of the stones. Mr. Nathan Day, who knows more about horses than the majority of men, was carefully lowered into the well, and placed several ropes around the imprisoned animal, which was then gradually lifted up by means of poles placed across the mouth of the well until he was raised high enough to be hauled out through the trench. He received a few bruises, and a sliver about a foot long was sticking in the skin of his flank, but did not penetrate the flesh.
