War Talk in England.

AN ALLEGED TREATY BETWEEN RUSSIA AND CHINA.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—The Sun's London special cable says:—The report that Russia has obtained extraordinary concessions in a secret treaty with China has given England something far more serious to think about than the Venezuelan boundary dispute. The Times's correspondent at Hong Kong is the only authority thus far for the assertion that Russia has obtained the right to build a branch of the Siberian railway to Port Arthur and practically establish a naval station there. The story finds some credence amongst those acquainted with the situation in the far east, who regard it as a diplomatic event of the first importance, as undoubtedly it is if it be true. There has not been such an outburst of bellicose talk in years as this rumor has caused in London in the past few hours. Respectable journals, such as the Pall Mall Gazette, use such language as this: "The outrage would madden an older and cooler nation than Japan, and we shall have a bloody war. If there is any nerve and foresight in the councils of England, she, too, will oppose it, and to the death. For us it spells the loss of every penny invested in China. It spells alien domination of the Pacific. It spells the ultimate but certain ruin of our trade, and Russian war ships off Vancouver and Sydney. We must act vigorously, at once, by diplomacy and by reading our fleets for sea. The re-occupation of Port Hamilton, or any better station there may be, is the smallest possible counter-move. It is almost the one advantage of Port Hamilton that it is in a sense the eye of Port Arthur. We ought at once to bring our China squadron up to the full strength of Russia's, lest Japan were to lose her feet unhelped at the first blood. All this we ought to do without waiting for confirmation or details."

This fairly indicates what would be the temper of the whole British public, without regard to party, if this diplomatic move by Russia become an accomplished fact. The impression prevails in certain well-informed quarters

that it is a feeling put forward by Russia. It may be well to recall the fact that the Paris correspondent of The Sun learned from high diplomatic authority, a few days after the treaty of peace was signed between China and Japan, that it was the intention of Russia to obtain precisely the concessions now named as the price of its friendly offices to China.

The London Standard, which, more than The Times, may be regarded as the Ministerial organ, prints an editorial to-day which may be confidently accepted as representing Lord Salisbury's views and which is sufficiently robust on the China question to suit the most extreme Russophobe.

"If," says the Standard, "Russian occupation of Port Arthur, disguised or open, ever be seriously proposed, the whole Chinese question will be opened and the various European powers will act as their interests shall dictate."

Not the least remarkable feature of The Standard's editorial is the deference paid to Japan, which is treated, in fact, as a great power whose interests are identical with England's. "The shrewd and courageous statesmen who direct the policy of that wonderful people will refuse point blank to give way if Russian occupation is to be the sequel to their withdrawal from Port Arthur," says Lord Salisbury's organ, and it concludes with a warning to Russia no less emphatic:—"If," it says, "the report that has been floated is a ballon d'essai it may serve a useful purpose by eliciting a distinct warning that no meddling with the existing balance of power in eastern Asia can be permitted either by Japan or by Great Britain."

That language is plain enough, and, if it have no other consequence, it must certainly inspire the Japanese with such confidence in their negotiations with Russia that they will possibly lose their heads and provoke an actual conflict, which England would rather avert.

The Hyams Case.

Mr. Francis Wellman, the New York lawyer who during the Hyams trial acted in a consultative capacity with the counsel for the defence, arrived in Toronto on Monday and had an interview of some length with Mr. E. F. B. Johnston, Q. C., and Mr. Thos. Horne, the Hyams brothers' Canadian counsel. He stated that his purpose in coming to Toronto is to go over the evidence for the defence and to look into the developments of the case. Mr. Johnston has stated that he intends to apply to the Attorney-General for the discharge of the prisoners without a further trial. He holds that in the first place the Crown has no further evidence than that over which the jury disagreed last Assizes, and that consequently the trial, with its attendant expense, should not be repeated, and that, in the second place, the evidence for the defence has been greatly strengthened. His reason, he said, for concluding that the Crown had no new witnesses was that no names of such had been supplied him, although he had made application to have them furnished him, announcing at the time that if they were withheld and then called at the trial he would apply to have the case put off till the next court. Mr. Johnston further stated that he had been told by Mr. Smoke, Mrs. Harry Hyams' solicitor, that she will not appear against her husband again.—Globe.

Chandler Predicts War.

CONCORD, N. H., Oct. 28th.—The Evening Monitor, Senator Chandler's paper, contains a leader from his pen to-night in which war with England is predicted. It has for its caption "Our Coming War with England—A Prediction," and is summarized thus:—"War between the United States and England is inevitable. It will arise on account of British disregard for our direct interests. It will also be forced by British encroachments upon other nations all over the world. It will be fought by us, having Russia as our European ally. As a war offensive on our part it may not happen within twenty years. As a defensive war it may come sooner and should be welcomed. One sure result will be the capture and permanent acquisition of Canada by the United States."
