Ten years ago the logs in Wisconsin ran four or five to 1,000 feet of lumber. Now 12, 15 and even 20 logs are required to furnish as much. In five years the decrease in diameter of the pine trees cut for lumber has been 35 per cent.

The high constable of Three Rivers has gone to Nicolet to look after the band of gypsies who are supposed to have in their possession Celia Leonard, aged three years, daughter of Mrs. Leonard, of Boston, and who has been missing from her home since Oct. 7th.

The survivors of Luoknow celebrated the thirty-seventh anniversary of their rescue the other day in London, with Gen. Sir William Olpherts, V. C., in the chair. He is a quiet, modest-looking old gentleman of 73 to-day, but forty years ago, in India, he was known as "Hell-fire Olpherts."

In Thessaly a priest of the Greek church died lately at the age of 120 years. During the last years of his life his memory became much weakened, so that often he didn't remember whether he had dined or not, and as a consequence he sometimes dined twice in succession or didn't dine at all.

A tin of beef over twenty years old was recently opened in Melbourne and found to be perfectly fresh, although not much flavor remained. This tin was one of several found in a coasting steamer, and it is estimated that during the twenty years it had been on board the steamer the beef had travelled some 400,000 miles.
