

NEW PHOTOGRAPH GALLERY.—Messrs. There the People Rule.
Although Queen Victoria can direct the foreign policy of the British nation and induce public opinion in the three Kingdoms, when the people are not roused, her Majesty counts for nothing in the crisis which has been brought on by Emperor William's insult to England. many. Queen Victoria's own son, Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh, is now a German prince, oath bound to fight against his own country and his mother's forces on sea or land. Thus every member of the Royal family has particularly good reasons for disliking a war with Germany. Queen Victoria reigns but the people rule, and the Queen and the royal family are powerless to prevent war with Germany if Emperor William gives Britain cause to fight.—*Toronto News.*
