Leave Kinmount at 4 p. m.; leave Gelert at 4.35; arrive at Haliburton at 5.30 p. m.

Britain's Naval Strength.

Great Britain in five days mobilized a fleet from her naval reserve, manned it and equipped it. More than that, she prepared and commissioned large reinforcements for the regular channel squadrons and sent out relief crews and extra ships to other stations. In other words, Great Britain has strengthened her naval squadrons at home and abroad, and in addition has prepared a fleet that could blow out of the water any fleet that the combined powers could get together in six months without weakening the fleets which they have at their various stations. During that time Britain could get together two other such fleets as the one which rides at anchor almost within sight of France and Germany. No other power or combination of powers could do at the present time what Great Britain has done. There is something else which not all the powers that will ever exist will be able to do, and that is to hoist an admiral's pennant on the flagship of the man who defeated the combined navies of France and Spain at Trafalgar.—*News.*

Four hundred horses have been killed during the fall and early winter on one range near Pyramid Lake, Nevada, and but \$2 was realized on each animal. The hide, mane and tail sold for that amount, and the carcass was valueless. But even at this price it was cheaper to kill the animals than keep them.
A bizzard was attracted by the headlight of a passenger engine running on the Louisville and Nashville one night recently, it is reported, and in the resulting collision the headlight exploded, covered the front of the engine with flame and scared the engineer, who

made an emergency stop that shook up and scared all the passengers. After the panic the burned body of the bizzard was found wedged in the broken headlight.

A Portland merchant has recently had illustrated to him, in the person of two commercial travellers, great vicissitudes of fortune. One who called to solicit trade for a certain brand of catchup was at one time one of the leading merchants of Boston, and his residence, when adversity came, sold under the hammer for \$73,000. The other, who had a line of cigars, had been twice elected governor of one of the largest of the middle western states.

A terrible accident, resulting in the killing of eight persons and the wounding of 60 occurred on Sunday at Manlevrier, near Angers, in the Department of Maine-et-Loire, France. The accident was due to the collapse of the village church, in which mass was being celebrated. The structure was comfortably filled, most of the worshippers being women and children. Suddenly the walls began to sway, and before all the congregation could get outside they fell. The roof descended upon the struggling throng beneath, and it is surprising that no more than eight persons were killed. The condition of some of the injured is so serious that it is feared they will die.
