Hiram Maxim has fitted to a tricycle a machine with two Maxim guns, each weighing 25 pounds and capable of firing 600 shots per minute.

Six thousand dozen eggs were cooked hard at one baking in Ovid, Mich., one day lately. They were stored in a warehouse which was burned.

Macomber, an Indian, who recently died at the Indian reservation near Saranac lake, at the alleged age of 103 years, is said to have had about 1,000 descendants.

Three men were suffocated at the consumers' Gas Works, in Wilkesbarre, Pa, on Wednesday. They were at work in a room, neglected to close a trap, and all were found dead.

Storms on the Black Sea have caused great loss of life and property. Seven steamers and eighteen sailing vessels have foundered, and it is believed that more than 100 persons have perished.

The trouble between the Monastery of Oka and the Revenue Department in connection with the seizure of an illicit still in the monastery has been settled at Ottawa by the community paying a fine of \$500.

A petition to the Minister of Fisheries, Ottawa, is being signed asking for the establishment of a hatchery for bass and maskinonge. It also points out the inadvisability of putting salmon fry into bass waters, and suggests the propriety of having fish-ways in all the dams on the Trent waters.

The growing scarcity of fur-bearing animals suggests to a writer in the London Spectator the feasibility of breeding such animals on farms in Siberia. Last spring, he says, a single silver fox skin sold in London for \$850, and he be lieves that silver foxes, as well as many other desirable fur-bearing animals, could be bred in great numbers in the proper climate.

At Chicago, on Wednesday a jury found Nic Marzen guilty of the murder of Fritz Holzhuetter, on January 30th, 1895, and condemned him to death. In closing his address, the prosecuting attorney picked up the butcher knife exhibited in the case to illustrate the murderous blow. The blade flew from the handle, and embedded itself in a pillar between the heads of two spec-

tators. The Smiths of the world are going to have their turn now. There is an unclaimed amount in the Bank of England belonging to the estate of one David Seymore Smith which has been aceumulating in the bank for 75 years, and which has now reached the coormous sum of \$80,000,000. An Ogdensburg man is among the claimants, but he does not count very much on the fortune. When interviewed on the matter he said : " The money is there, and we are here, and the trouble is we are both likely to remain so. I will take five dollars, cash, for my share."

James Fitzgerald was hanged at St. Louis, Mo, on February 20, for the murder of his sweetheart, Annie Naessens on the night of November 24th. 1893. When the trap was sprung the rope broke and the victim lay struggling on the ground beneath the gallows. The black cap was instantly removed by the doctors, who found Fitzgerald still conscious. Stimulants were given and he revived, and was taken into the morrine a few feet away and further cared for by the doctors. A new rope was sent for at once, and at 11 o'clock the sick and trembling man was again taken to the scaffold. At 11.02 the trap was sprung, and this time the condemned man went to death.
