School Board Meeting.

Fenelon Falls, March 30th, 1896. The Board met for the purpose of appointing a secretary and treasurer. Members all present except Mr. Austin. Mr. McDougall was appointed secretary for the meeting. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. A number of applications were received.

Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Robson, That the application of W. T. Junkin for the position of secretary-treasurer of this School Board be accepted at a salary of \$35 per annum. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. McKendry, That the auditors' report for 1895 and the special audit from Jan 1st to March 30th, 1896, for the Fenelon Falls School Board, be adopted, and that the sec-treasurer be instructed to have the required number of the annual report printed.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. McKendry, That the administration of the late treasurer be paid the sum of \$7 50, being payment of salary for the month of January to February, 1896.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Robson, and resolved, That this School Board deeply regret the loss by death of our secretary-treasurer, the late Mr. John Jordan, and take this first opportunity of tendering his sorrowing widow and friends our sincere sympathy in their bereavement; and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded the widow.
