Under the circumstances, practically nothing could be done to save the building, and only a portion of the contents could be got out. The hotel was built over twenty years ago by Captain Crandell, who sold it to Mr. E. H. Dunham, from whom it was purchased comparatively recently by his brother-in-law, Mr. W. H. Simpson. We don't know what it cost, but the Methodist Conference at one time offered \$9,000 for it as a home or place of temporary resort (we forget which) for aged or overworked ministers. The insurance amounted to \$4.-000 as follows: -On the hotel, \$2.000; on furniture etc., \$1,250; on hall, \$500; on stock, \$250. Mr. Simpson's loss is heavier than it would have been if the fire had happened earlier in the year, as the season was to have opened on Tuesday, and preparations for the reception of guests had just been completed.
