#### Ontario Mines Boom.

An Euglish, syndicate has completed the purchase, through Mr. John A. Patterson, of Messrs. Kerr, Macdonald, Davidson and Patterson, of the Mikado gold mine, in the Rainy River District. The mine is 100 acres in extent, and is situated on Shoal Lake, west of Lake of the Woods. The price paid was \$25,-800, and the former owners were Messrs. Burn & Scovill, of Rat Portage. An Indian first discovered the gold vein and notified the Rat Portage firm, which offered the English syndicate an option on the property. An expert from London came out, and, after examining the prospect, reported so favorably that Mr. Patterson was cabled to buy at once at the owner's price. The purchasers will develop the mine immediately, and will ship the ore, a considerable quantity of which is in sight, to the stamp mill of Messrs. Ahn & Hay, at Rat Portage, 20 miles distant.
