TOPICS OF A WEEK.

The Important Events in a Few Words For Busy Readers.

CANADIAN.

Frost and snow have already visited London township.

Mrs. Lockerty, of Belleville, was killed by the electric cars.

Attorney-General Sifton has returned to Winnipeg from Ottawa.

Sir David Macpherson died on board the steamer Labrador in mid-ocean.

Bancroft, Ont., is negotiating for the construction of iron smelting works.

The electric light and waterworks by-law was carried in Listowel by a small majority.

The Ontario Entomological Society will hold its annual meeting in London October 21.

An effort is now being made to amalgamate the Toronto Public and High School Boards.

Mr. George E. Suffell, of St. Thomas, left an estate of \$100,000, divided between relatives.

Bush fires are raging in British Columbia. New Westminster is surrounded and threatened on every side.

Harry Farewell, late of Oshawa, was burned to death in a fire which destroyed his house, near Innisfail, N. W. T.

The Bank of Montreal now refuses to accept United States bills as well as silver at its head office in Montreal.

The Niagara Fruit Growers' Association will do no more business with commission men who refuse to remit weekly.

The Western Union Telegraph Company has secured a controlling interest in the American Bell Telephone Company.

The Presse announces that Mr. Alfred Thibaudeau, of Montreal, has been named to the Senate to succeed Mr. Angers, resigned.

Rev. J. H. Long has resigned his pastorate of the First Unitarian church, Hamilton, to become editor of the Windsor Review.

Mr. S. Hallgrinson, a farmer of Glenboro, fell from a load of hay, striking on the back of his neck, dying two days later from his injuries.

The Cultivator, Mr. Tarte's organ, says that it is more than probable Mr. Laurier will go to England, where Canada has great interests.

The C. P. R. has granted free transportation for a collection of the products of Alberta to be shown at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition.

Farmer John Crake, of Writcenroun, is charged with paying his hired man Grimes \$5 to set fire to a house to get insurance on the furniture.

The Ontario Methodist Camp Ground Company, Grimsby, has entered suit against Clark Boon, of North Grimsby, for the enforcement of a lease.

A boiler in Mr. George Talyor's shops at St. Thomas exploded on Saturday, and, although a number of persons were close at hand, no serious are reported.

Archbishop Begin, of Quebec, has issued to his clergy a circular favoring the anti-Masonic Congress, which meets next month at Trente, in the Austrian Tyrol.

It is reported that President Beckley, who is in England negotiating for the sale of Toronto, Hamilton, and Buffalo railway bonds, is meeting with great success.

Mayor Fleming had an interview with General Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk in Montreal, and received assurances that the Grand Trunk shops would remain in Toronto.

Passengers on the steamship Lake Ontario at the time of the collision with the Vancouver deny the statements of Johnston, who reflected on the Lake Ontario's officers.

By the premature explosion of a charge of dynamite at Parry Island, Ont., two men, named Jim Smith and Arthur Hillman, were killed, and John Olsen badly injured.

Mr. Ambrose Winters was drowned at Fisher's Mills, Hespeler. He was alone in a boat, and, as he had suffered from epilepsy for years, it is supposed that he fell overboard in a fit.

Major-General Cameron, commandant of the Royal Military College, Kingston, has been notified by the Government that his services would not be required after the first of September.

Mr. Robert Purdy, a well-to-do farmer of Ernestown township, committed suicide by cutting his throat with a razor. A short while ago deceased received a sunstroke, which affected his brain.

By the burning of Mrs. Quaffe's house at Huntsville five lives were lost. Mrs. Quaffe and Mrs. Phillips lost their lives in attempting to save the children. Two of Mrs. Quaffe's children perished, and Miss Jessie Phillips was so badly burned that she succumbed to her injuries on Sunday.

Word comes from Bothwell oil fields that of the ten recent tests made all have been successful. Two of them are over three hundred barrels each. Never in the history of oil testing in any part of America have such results been obtained. The total yield daily is nearly 1,000 barrels. Mr. Hiram Walker will erect a refinery.

UNITED STATES.

Another advance in freights on anthracite coal is announced.

The Hudson River from its source to the ocean is 400 miles in length.

The next annual convention of American Florists will be held at Providence, R. I.

Twelve people sat down at an Etna, N. H., dinner table recently whose united ages were 950 years.

The Whitten Cycle Co., of Providence, R. I., has assigned with liabilities and assets nominally \$50,000.

A locomotive plant capable of building 200 engines a year is to be shipped from Philadelphia to Russia.

For the first four months of this year the losses by fire in the United States have averaged \$336,879 per day.

The popular vote of the United States, at the election in November, it is estimated, will be close to 13,000,000.

A lady in Nebraska advertised for a husband, and announced: "I own a good job printing office and can set type."

An excursion train run exclusively by women left Syracuse for the Thousand Islands.

A big blaze at the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton Railway shops at Lima, Ohio, did \$60,000 damage.

Fire destroyed the exposition building and a lot of frame structures at the Buffalo Driving Park.

A New York dentist employs a woman assistant, who goes from house to house and cleans teeth. The charge is 5 cents a month, and she does a big business.

Miss Fannie McKinnon, a compositor in a newspaper office in Superior, Wis., has just received \$40,000 from a gold mine stock investment made ten years ago.

At Huntington, Ind., Wallace's show tents were wrecked by the storm. The horses and menagerie stampeded and much property was ruined. The elephants caused a panic.

The Liberty, Mo., blacksmith who offered to shoe a horse all around in 15 minutes has performed the feat in nine minutes, and his wife is as good a blacksmith as he is.

It is reported that every state, except Nevada, Idaho and Utah, and possibly a southern state, will send a full delegation to the gold Democrats' convention in Indianapolis.

The Maine Bible Society has, during the past year, found 95 towns in the state without religious worship, and half the families visited were found to be without religious influences.

In Harbor Springs, Mich., there is a large and flourishing wood toothpick industry. White birch is exclusively used in the manufacture of the toothpicks, and about 7,500,000 are turned out daily.

Some enterprising young electricians in Brooklyn have been tapping the trolley wires and supplying electric lights to storekeepers. Every month the regularly collected the bills for the stolen lights.

The famous collection of violins owned by the late R. D. Hawley, of Hartford, has been sold to a California man for \$20,000. The collection consists of 12 instruments, which are among the finest in the world.

In 1880 there were 66,407 "civilized" Indians; in 1890 there were 58,506. The uncivilized Indians are not enumerated. In 1880 there were 105,405 Chinese in the United States, and in 1890 there were 107,475.

United States Secretary Hoke Smith has resigned his portfolio. Being the only member of President Cleveland's Cabinet who supports the Chicago ticket, he is consequently out of harmony with his colleagues.

Four old street cars are used by John V. Bohannon, of Baltimore, as a home for himself and family. They are on suburban ground, for which he does not have to pay rent. They cost him ten dollars each.

Two women were asleep on a feather bed in their home at Bonne Terre, Md., when lightning struck the house and set fire to the shuck mattress under the bed, but the women were unharmed. The feathers repelled the electricity.

A munificent sum-off was awarded to a lad who had spent four years as an apprentice on a farm near Bath, without receiving a cent in pay. The whole-souled farmer gave him a quarter on his last day of service, with the advice to save his money.

Current literature gives the amounts of money spent yearly by 20 of the leading libraries of the country. The Boston public library leads, with an income of \$170,000, and Chicago is second, with \$125,000. After these two leaders there is a great gap, and Minneapolis comes third, with \$55,000.

FOREIGN.

Russia will make Vladivostock a commercial port.

The Shah's eldest son was installed at Tabreez as heir-apparent of Persia.

The new roller steamer, the invention of M. Bajinawa, has been launched at St. Denis, France.

Merchants in St. John's, Nfld., will not accept American coin and are discounting American bills.

Insurgents in Macedonia have burned two villages in the Kozoni district and massacred 50 persons.
