## To Prolong Life.

## INSURANCE COMPANIES TO BUILD A HOME FOR CONSUMPTIVE POLICY HOLDERS.

The large and enormously wealthy insurance companies are considering a scheme to prolong human life. It is not a newborn spirit of philanthropy that has actuated them, but a strictly businesslike, though in every way laudable, desire to save themselves from financial loss by availing themselves of the best medical skill and appliances. Steps are now being taken by these companies which will result in the building of a sanitarium for the express purpose of prolonging the lives of consumptive policy holders. It is a pure matter of business. They believe they will be able to save an immense amount of money by providing sanitariums for those of their policy holders who are affected with tuberculosis, instead of allowing the disease to proceed unchecked until it results in the premature death of the policy holder. The sanitarium will fulfill the medical and surgical ideal. Every method known to science and art will be employed and every theory advanced by the great scientists of the world to check the invasion of the dread disease will be promptly tried, so that hereafter the consumptive who is fortunate enough to hold a policy in one of the companies connected with the sanitarium may feel confident that he will be enabled to live as long as there is any human way of keeping the breath of life in his body.

It is believed, too, that the influence of all this upon the patient's mental attitude will act beneficially upon his health, for he will not only have the feeling that his family will be provided for after his death, but also that they will have assurance that the best medical care in the world has been given to him, and that no millionaire that ever lived could have had better. Dr. A. Jacobi, of New York city, who has made a study of a somewhat similar idea recently tried in Europe, says that under patient care and skilful treatment consumptives have been restored to usefulness in the community. The thought of founding the great sanitarium in America, however, has come from Dr. Dennison, a specialist of Denver. One of the early results which is expected from the establishment of the insurance sanitarium is that the time will soon come when consumptives, no less than persons in good health, will be insured by the companies. This is no mere theory, but, according to Mr. Halsey, vice-president of the Manhattan Life company, is a policy that will be forced upon the American companies. Already those in Germany having the sanitarium system in operation are planning to have their respective branches in this country take up such risks, and the American companies will have to defend themselves by doing the same. By refusing they would lose not only the consumptive patients, but hundreds of others every year, who would be influenced by the greater benefits of the German companies. Indeed, under such a system thousands of persons will be insured for the simple purpose of securing the advantage of the medical treatment.—*New York Herald.*

## Mad Through Religion.

Religious frenzy has made a victim of a young Frenchman of great expectations, who is now immured in a private asylum. On leaving college he wanted to become a Capuchin friar, and to bury himself in a monastery. His father, a wealthy provincial lawyer, strongly objected to this, and pointed out that his son should be able to succeed him. The youth accordingly obeyed, and began to prepare for the bar. His parent, in the meantime, planned a marriage for him, finding a bride both rich and beautiful. The happy pair spent the honeymoon in Switzerland, and then came to Paris, where the husband seemed to have completely lost his mystical propensities. A few days since, however, his manner towards his wife suddenly changed. He began to upbraid her with standing between him and the gates of heaven, and said that, but for her and his father, he might be engaged in the work of saving his soul instead of having to remain the prey of the world, the flesh and the devil. Then, after having recited a prayer and intoned a canticle, the young man took up a stick and began to beat his wife, who had to rush to a neighbor's flat for protection.

Policemen having been sent for, they found the lunatic barricaded in his bedroom singing canticles in a loud and triumphant voice. An entry was effected through a window, and the mystical maniac was seized by the legs, bound, and conveyed to a private asylum.

## Bog Ore in Ontario.

For several days Mr. W. H. Edgar, an expert of the Hamilton Smelting Works, has been in this neighborhood, prospecting for bog ore, and was very successful in finding large deposits of it on the following farms:—Geo. Thompson's, 11th concession; John Seave's, 10th concession, and J. E. Bedard's, 11th concession, Howard. Bog ore has been mined also in Norfolk county, and at Olinda, in Essex county. At the latter place it was at one time cast into stoves, ploughs, etc. Its value now consists in the smelting process with iron ore, and for this purpose Mr. Edgar will ship three or four cars per day. This will give employment to many teams and laborers, and will also help the railways. Mr. Edgar is continuing his prospecting, and will doubtless find deposits on many other farms. A mining expert has been telegraphed for, and will probably be here to-day, when operations will at once begin of mining the ore and shipping it to Hamilton.—*Ridgetown Standard.*

## Took Him for an Evil Spirit.

Rat Portage, Dec. 6.—The Sabas-Kong Indians cherish the belief that Wendigo, or the Evil Spirit, sometimes appears in human form to annoy the tribe and damage its property. Recently they posted sentinels to catch the spirit. On the eighth night of the watch one of the Indians saw a ghost-like image moving from place to place, trailing a blanket behind it in a peculiar way. He challenged the figure twice, and, receiving no reply, felt sure it was Wendigo. He fired, and recognized his foster father in the yell which the figure gave as it fell dead. The Indian was tried for murder at the Assizes here, found guilty of manslaughter, and sentenced to six months' hard labor. When charging the jury Mr. Justice Rose said that the case had no parallel in the whole history of law. He will refer the case to other judges.

## A Rotary Steam Engine.

Out in a Minnesota town, which bears the unconventional name of Sleepy Eye, lives one Grant Brambel, a man who has kept his eyes open long enough in the past twelve years to invent and build a rotary steam engine so simple and so powerful that an English syndicate has just paid him £320,000, or nearly \$2,000,000, for the right to make and sell it. This is a somewhat large story, but it seems to be true, for careful tests of the machine by experts from London preceded the sale, and their reports on its merits fully justify the payment of this enormous price. Brambel is described as a quiet, unassuming person, but it is rumored that he has invented a dynamo even more remarkable than his engine. This he proposes to exploit himself, now that he has capital enough to do so, and, if it proves to be as effective as he expects, his present fortune will be merely a foundation for his future wealth.

## A Message from the Sea.

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 5.—The Australian steamer Warrimo, which arrived from Australia, reports one of the most remarkable tales of the sea chronicled in recent years. A bottle was picked up near Cape Kidnapper, New Zealand, just before the Canadian liner left Sydney, containing an unsealed message to the effect that the ship Mohawk sprang a leak in lat. 42.21 south, and long. 160.24 west, and that the crew was taking to the boats as a last hope. The message, which was yellow with age, concluded:—"God help us. (Signed) John Franklin."  
The Mohawk, John Franklin, mate, was lost, with all hands, sixteen years ago on a voyage from Quebec to Troon, in Ayrshire, and this wave-buffed message is the first word that has been heard as to how she met her doom.

News has been received by the steamer Almeda, from Sydney, of the massacre of a party of gold hunters, composed of six whites and five natives, by the cannibals of the Solomon Islands.
