### We Should Retaliate.

PROFESSOR GOLDWIN SMITH SAYS WE MUST TAKE ACTION IF THE CORLISS CLAUSE BECOMES LAW IN THE UNITED STATES.

New York, Feb. 27.—Prof. Goldwin Smith is in New York, where he will attend the banquet of Cornell alumni to-night. He has been interviewed in New York and asked his opinion of the Corliss clause in the Immigration bill, by which aliens cannot reside in Canada and do business in the United States daily.

Dr. Goldwin Smith said: "It prevents those Canadians who reside opposite Detroit, and in those small towns opposite Buffalo and Niagara Falls, from coming over daily and working. It is not only an absurd law, if it becomes law, but it is the veriest clap-trap imaginable. Congressman Corliss is evidently endeavoring to make political capital by it, and I hope the President will veto it. I understand that the President has sent the bill to Secretary Olney to hear his report on it. As I said, it is clap-trap, and I will show how utterly absurd and uncalled for such legislation is. It is true many Canadians live in these small towns, the suburbs of Detroit, Buffalo and Niagara Falls, and have employment in the latter cities. They take out of these little money. In fact, I suppose they do their trading and their wives do their shopping in the larger cities. But say they do take much of their money into Canada, why, the entire amount would not equal the sum spent by a United States millionaire in one European summer trip. But I do not believe they save as much in Canada as they spend in the cities where they are employed."

"What will Canada do if the bill becomes law?"

"Canada will pass retaliatory measures, of course, and much irritation and unkind feeling will be engendered. Already there is much feeling on the subject, and the Canadians who are anti-United States are not slow in expressing their opinions and making the best of the situation. What must the friends of this country think if such a bill becomes law? I am not attacking the bill generally, but the clause that Congressman Corliss had inserted. It is unjust discrimination against a friendly and neighborly nation, and is inspired by politics alone. I hope the papers of this country will point out the absurdity of such a clause and prevent, if possible, its enactment."

"Have you any idea what kind of retaliation laws Canada would enact?"

"That is for the future. But why should not Canada resent anything so preposterous and unjust?" The professor talked about the Cuban question and the situation in Crete. In answer to questions, he said that it would be a serious mistake for the United States to annex Cuba. "It would give," he added, "great trouble to this country, and be a never-ending source of discord and bickering."

### AN UNTRUE STATEMENT.

Windsor, Feb. 27.—The report that Gov. Pingree had discharged all Canadians employed by Pingree & Smith in Detroit is untrue. Gov. Pingree opposes the bill, and it is said he is using his influence to secure a veto.

The persons who work in Windsor and live in Detroit, and vice versa, are known well enough to be accurately counted. The result of a count yesterday shows that 172 men and 83 women crossed to Detroit, while 134 men and 23 women crossed from Detroit to Windsor.

Three girls were going from Montreal to Chicago. They attempted to cross via the Grand Trunk. A rigid examination disclosed that the girls were under contract before they left Montreal to be employed in Chicago; at least the inspector concluded they were. They and their trunks were shipped back to Windsor. It is the first known instance where females have been turned back at Detroit when travelling through as immigrants. They are stopping at a Windsor hotel.

A bet was recently made in Paris that an expert could not cut up 2,000 sandwiches within 24 hours, the amount of the wager, 2,000 francs, to go to the expert if successful, and the sandwiches to be distributed among the hospitals of Paris. The person selected was a woman employed in one of the cafes. She completed the task in 19 hours and 20 minutes.

### The Bishops at Rome.

An interesting story is made public by Le Signal, a French weekly paper, regarding the misrepresentations made to Rome on the school question. It points out that, notwithstanding the verdict of the people on the 23rd of June, the Bishops rushed off to Rome to secure the interference of the Pope. They presented their side of the case, in which it well known there were several misstatements, but the Papal authorities wanted to hear the other side also. "Their Lordships the Bishops," says Le Signal, "found a very ingenious way to prevent the appearance of the accused. The Prefect of the Propaganda, having read the factum of their Lordships concerning their attitude during the last election campaign, remarked, it is alleged, that it would be well to have Mr. Laurier's version. Thereupon a number of protests were raised, which, however, did not prevent Cardinal Ledochowski from insisting on the necessity of hearing the party accused. A brilliant thought struck the mind of Mgr. Gravel, the Bishop of Nicolet. 'Eminence,' said he, addressing the Cardinal, 'the faithful are under the impression that Catholics alone are admitted before the tribunal.'

"They are right," replied the Prefect of the Propaganda.

"Do they admit a Freemason?" asked Mgr. Gravel.

"A Freemason! Never!" replied the Cardinal.

"Now, Mr. Laurier is a Freemason!" cried out their Lordships the Bishops. "He does not perform his Easter duties."

"Such is the version that has been reported of that unfortunate affair, and that is how it happens that in the Eternal City, the seat of Christendom and the hope of the Catholics, the name of Mr. Laurier figures on the black-list of Freemasons. Nevertheless, we are asked to accept a judgment based upon such allegations. No, no; justice does not die, and the Liberals will suffer for a long time before they submit to such mockeries."

### Bicycles in Africa.

One would scarcely expect to find bicycles and a bicycle club in the heart of Africa, and 600 miles from any railroad. One club in Bulawayo, Matabeleland, South Africa, is in a flourishing condition, having twenty-five members out of a population of 2,500. During the late war in Matabeleland these bicyclers all rendered valuable service to the English. By them scouts were often able to "locate the enemy" or to deliver a message, where a man on horseback would not have dared to go, for a Kaffir can outrun a horse every time—that is, such horses as they have in Africa. In one instance a bicycler put to rout a whole impi (a camp) of Kaffirs, who evidently had never seen a bicycle before, and this man, who came nearer to the camp than he had any intention of doing, and was much alarmed for his own safety when he realized where he was, took heart again when he saw these Kaffirs throw up their hands as if in consternation, and, uttering savage sounds and noises, jump to their feet and run for their lives. They evidently thought the devil was after them.

### Illustrated Sermons.

"John of Gaunt," in the Toronto Star, says:—

"Always deeply interested in sensational preaching, the antics of a reverend man in Michigan have delighted me exceedingly. To terrify tobacco-smokers he carried a plump cat into the pulpit with him and sent it into the world of spirits by placing nicotine under its tongue. As the expiring feline kicked frantically in the agonies of dissolution, we are told that the divine grew eloquent and thundered an awful lesson to the users of the noxious weed which the bad man Raleigh took over to Queen Bess. Last Sunday the stomach of a drunkard was handled by the minister, and all the blotches and red spots upon its surface, every one of them illustrating the horrors of intemperance, were pointed out to the congregation. Now let the Toronto sensational preachers be as original as the Michigan Methodist and churches will be so crowded that women will faint by scores, the coffers will be filled and the Armenian horror meetings of the Salvation Army will be nowhere as drawing powers."
