Windsor, Feb. 27.—The report that Gov. Pingree had discharged all Cana-Detroit is untrue. Gov. Pingree oppos es the bill, and it is said he is using his influence to secure a veto.

The persons who work in Windsor and live in Detroit, and vice versa, are known well enough to be accurately counted. The result of a count yesterday shows that 172 men and 83 women crossed to Detroit, while 134 men and 23 women crossed from Detroit to Wind-

Three girls were going from Montreal to Chicago. They attempted to cross via the Grand Trunk. A rigid examination disclosed that the girls were under contract before they left Montreal to be employed in Chicago; at least the inspector concluded they were. They and their trunks were shipped back to Windsor. It is the first known instance where females have been turned back at Detroit when travelling through as immigrants. They are stopping at a Windsor hotel.

One would scarcely expect to find bicycles and a bicycle club in the heart of Africa, and 600 miles from any railroad.
