Dan Kane, a Brooklyn, N. Y., man, is held by the police for throwing his 300-pound wife out of the window. The woman is dead. Kane was arrested on the evidence of his child.

A London judge has decided that money put into the contribution box by mistake cannot be recovered, the custodians having no right to return it, because it has become "an accepted offering to the Lord."

A Baltimore man who demanded \$3,500 from a street railroad company as damages for the alleged breaking of his arm, was offered \$100 as a compromise and refused it, and was then subjected to the test of the X ray, which showed that his heavily bandaged arm was not broken and never had been.

It is very likely that there will be a largely increased demand for shovels at Grand Haven, Mich., since the publication of this item in one of the papers of that city a day or two ago: "Several barrels of choice whiskey are said to be buried under the big sandhill across the river, having been put there years ago."

In spite of the many efforts to keep the Irish language alive, it would appear that it is rapidly dying out. Statistics show that ten years ago 64,000 persons spoke nothing but Irish. In 1891 there were only 33,000. In 1881 there were 835,000 who could speak English and Irish, while last year the number had declined to 642,000.

The steamship Arcadia of the Hamburg-American Packet Company took out of Montreal port, on her recent trip, the largest cargo of grain that has ever left that port in one vessel's hold. It consisted of 96,000 bushels of oats, 88,000 of buckwheat, 74,000 of corn, 8,000 of peas and 3,900 of wheat, making a total of 270,000 bushels. Besides this she had on board 500 tons of general cargo. With the exception of the corn, the entire cargo was Canadian product.

An inquest was held recently at Birmingham on the body of an unfortunate man who died of rabies caused by the bite of a cat. The creature went mad in due form, flew at the man, and hung on to him with tooth and claw for ten minutes. During his illness deceased could not bear the sight of water, and was frightened at everyone going near him. He had spasms, and complained of the air blowing in his face. He became wildly maniacal, struggling with hospital attendants, and attacking and spitting at doctors who went to him.

A short time ago at a place near Loughrea, while three farmers, Mrs. Rafferty and two men, were returning homewards in a large creel on a horse-drawn cart, they suddenly found themselves in the bog at Danesfort. Recent rains had softened and spread beyond its normal bounds the great area of Turban. The horse shied, and the creel, overturning, fell with its face to the surface and imprisoned the three occupants, who rapidly sank in the liquid turf. As they were disappearing from view they were all rescued in a very exhausted condition by a herd. The horse and cart, a load of provisions, and a bag of money sank out of sight.
