Moved by Mr. Currins, seconded by Mr. Palmer, That this council desire to give expression to their belief that each municipality should purchase its own road machinery.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Webster, That the collector be allowed an abatement of Mrs. McNeil's taxes, and that the following charity grants be made out of the poor rate: Mary McFayden \$5, Sarah McFayden \$5, Mrs. Sanguines \$5, E. Fieldhouse \$10.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Parkins, seconded by Mr. Webster, That the following bills be paid: Mr. Swanton, for repairs to Pearu's bridge, \$3; E. D. Hand, advertising Court of Revision, \$1 50; Josiah Perrin, attending six families during isolation from diphtheria, \$41 50; Mrs. McGee, 90c.; W. Hall, services calling Board of Health to special meeting, \$2; J. Campbell, use of room for council, \$1.—Carried.

The council then adjourned.
