He Can Stand His Title.

It is not a matter of very great surprise that some men are criticizing the Canadian Premier for accepting the knighthood which was pressed upon him in this jubilee year. Two classes of people are out with arguments, which date back almost to the middle ages, so useless and unconvincing are they. The high-minded Conservative journals, of course, complain of Mr. Laurier's inconsistency in accepting a title which he always looked on with some opposition. But, as the undercurrent of these journals' bright ideas is the conviction that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, unlike the king, can do nothing but wrong, the opinions so earnestly expressed must not be taken very seriously. But it must be admitted that some Liberals do not appreciate titles, and object to their leader being adorned by a title. But times have changed since it was part and parcel of the Liberal party to hate all things British, and to look on any recognition of merit and worth as anti-Liberal.

In the old days it must be admitted that our connection with Great Britain was somewhat visionary, and many Canadians had an idea that the time was not far distant when Canada might be an independent democratic nation. But the greatest feature of this great jubilee is the fostering and encouraging of the Imperial policy. That is the greatest element now in the policy of the Liberal party of Canada. To lend some aid to this, Sir Wilfrid conformed to British customs, and, to further strengthen the Imperial idea, he consented to bear a British title. In the days, and many of us can remember them, when knighthood and titles were not the reward for merit and worth, it is not to be wondered at that Mr. Laurier looked with little admiration on the custom. But, now that titles are not given as political favors, or to be purchased, they are not so objectionable that the recipient need be ashamed of his letters.

At any rate, the matter is not a serious one. Talk as he may, no person can convince even himself that the Canadian Premier has injured himself or the country which is proud of him in becoming Sir Wilfrid Laurier.—*Toronto Star.*

The New Ontario.

FARM PRODUCTS FROM THE RAINY RIVER DISTRICT.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture has received from Mr. A. Lockling, its correspondent at Emo, Rainy River district, a box containing samples of the various products of that promising land. The box was shipped on June 3rd by freight, and contained, among other things, grain, spring wheat and potatoes, all produced last season. The potatoes had remained in the ground all winter and were perfectly sound. In fact they had started to sprout in the box. There were also some samples of fruit trees and fruit shrubs, which indicated that fruit of several varieties can be successfully grown in the Rainy River country. There was also a bunch of rhubarb grown out of doors, and fit for use, since May 5th. This is a record quite equal to the garden production of the older settled parts of Ontario.

Mr. Lockling also enclosed honey-comb from the first hive introduced into that section, and a sample of wool from the first flock of sheep. These are owned by himself. Mr. Lockling says that last year his wheat was harvested with a self-binder, the first taken into the district. As further proof of the productiveness of that section, he included in the collection some pansies and other flowers in blossom, which had remained out of doors without any protection other than that afforded by the snow. Several samples of the soil were also sent down.

The sending of the box was in answer to certain criticisms of a report made by Mr. Lockling to the Bureau of Industries, in which he dealt with the wonderful agricultural possibilities of the Rainy River district. A number of persons corresponded with him in regard to the matter, and some of them appeared doubtful of the accuracy of his report. To satisfy these doubters the box was sent down, and its contents can be seen at the Parliament buildings.—*Globe.*

Riddled with Hail.

THE KANSAS CAPITAL PUTS IN AN AWFUL HOUR.

Topeka, Kansas, June 25.—The worst hailstorm known in the history of Kansas struck this city last night. Hailstones weighing 12 to 16 ounces stripped the trees of their foliage, smashed window panes, including the finest plate glass store fronts, cut down telegraph and telephone wires, riddled awnings and inflicted unprecedented damage throughout the city. Dogs were struck in the streets and instantly killed, and horses were knocked to their knees. When the fury of the storm had passed, dead birds were found everywhere. Frequent and terrific lightning accompanied the storm.

Topeka looks like a city that has withstood an artillery siege. There are not a dozen buildings in the town that are not almost windowless and many roofs were caved in. The roofs of street-cars also were pierced. The damage wrought can better be imagined when it is known that the hailstones ranged in size from that of a hen's egg to that of an ostrich, egg and that 30 minutes after the storm, one hailstone was picked up which measured fourteen inches in circumference. Surgeons are busy dressing the wounds of persons injured in the storm, and reports of injuries continue to be received. Many were hurt in runaways.

On the top of the parish church tower at Bicknoller, Somersetshire, is a yew tree, now five feet high and still growing.

News has been received at Winnipeg that a disease resembling small-pox has broken out in a colony of Galicians who settled at Gonar last year. Immigration agents have gone to investigate.

Thousands of dollars' worth of property was destroyed in Logan County, Ill., on Friday by a tornado. Of twenty-two persons who took refuge in a barn on the farm of the State Institution for the feeble-minded four were taken out dead and the superintendent will die.

The other day on the estate of Belfield, Musselburgh, a stone cist was exposed while workmen were excavating sand and gravel. In the cist were found a well-preserved human skeleton and an urn, which were acquired for the Edinburgh University Anatomical Museum by Dr. Simpson, who states that they date back to the Bronze Age.
