APPOINTMENT.—Mr. Thomas Lane of Fenelon Falls has been appointed inspector of concrete at Rosedale, a position for which those who are qualified to judge say he is well fitted. The foundation of the new bridge is not being built of stone, as experience has shown that it is not as suitable for the purpose as concrete, which is a mixture of crushed rock, Portland cement, sand and gravel; and it is Mr. Lane's duty to see that these ingredients are properly mingled in exactly the right proportions before the concrete is used.

A BAD FALL.—Yesterday (Thursday) forenoon, while Messrs. Peter Dayman, Fred Chambers, William Sandford and Harry Littleton were working at the sort of bridge that is being built from Mr. E. Sandford's factory to his new wheel-house below the dam, the stick of square timber on which they were standing tilted, and they all fell a distance of sixteen feet onto the smooth rock over which there is about a foot of water. Young Sandford was so badly out on the head and face that a doctor had to be sent for; but the other three escaped with comparatively trifling injuries.

CHEAP RATES TO TORONTO.—Miss Booth of the Salvation Army is conducting a very special series of meetings in Toronto, beginning on Monday, Oct. 11th, and continuing till Sunday, Oct. 17th. There will be about 300 Army officers present. CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette.

Sir,— Since the recent fire in Mr. Ellis's mill yard I have been thinking that, if our town could afford it at all, we should take steps to procure a good steam fire engine and improve our fire protection. If we had the engine we could soon have a very adequate fire protection for the whole town. As it is now, only the front street about up to my place, or at any rate within a limited distance of the pumping power near the big bridge, is there any protection. Had we had a steam fire engine the other day, that fire in the mill yard could soon have been extinguished, but as it was, owing to the long delay in getting started, and the very weak streams thrown out, they only served as a damper to the more rapid progress of the flames. Our town is somewhat favorably situated for fire protection. The lake to the west and the river and canal through the centre furnish plenty of water, for the summer use especially. And I have been thinking that if large tanks—capable of holding forty or fifty barrels or more—were sunk in connection with the several streams that run through the village, say one at the bridge near the Rev. Mr. McKinnon's, two others on the same stream, one on Bond street west and one at or near the rink on Francis street west; then one on Colborne street near Mrs. McArthur's; also one near Mrs. Wallace's on Bond street east, that they could be made to supply water for any ordinary fire. Of course they would require careful attention, so as not to be allowed to fill up with a deposit, and in winter would have to be kept so that the trap door could be lifted in order to drop the suction pipe into it. That could be made the duty of some person, to be responsible for one or all of such tanks. Then a man could be employed to keep a hole or two in certain places on the canal and lake, for the same purpose, in the winter time. If a vote were taken on the question some time in the near future, and if it should be the wish of the people to procure a steam fire engine, debentures could be issued extending the cost over a number of years, which would not increase our taxes to such an extent as to make it a burden on us. Now, Mr. Editor, I think I have written enough to open up the question, and as I said "I have been thinking," I am open to correction, and if there is any much better plan set forth by any other person I shall be pleased to fall in with the best. But I would like to hear the opinions of others on the subj—

whether or not we should have any better fire protection, and, if so, what kind and the probable cost of the same.
