King of Toronto, having already bought for shipment no fewer than 15,000 turkeys, 5,000 geese, 1,000 ducks and 1,000 chickens, for which he paid over \$2,000, and which will cross the Atlantic in time for the Christmas trade.

KICKED BY A HORSE.—Last Tuesday morning Mr. Samuel Corbett of this village, was kicked on the outside of his left thigh by one of the horses which he has been driving for several months past, and which has always been a very good-tempered animal. He had partially harnessed it in the stable at the mill yard, and when he drew off its blanket the breeching fell down onto its hocks, which probably alarmed it, and it struck out with its right hind leg. Mr. Corbett was knocked down by the force of the blow, and crawled to some straw, upon which he lay for about half an hour, thinking he would soon be all right; but finding the pain was getting worse instead of abating, as he expected, a bed was made for him in a waggon with a quantity of hay and he was taken home. The bone of the leg was not broken, neither was the flesh cut; but by next day the limb had greatly swollen and he complained of a soreness across his chest. He did not send for a doctor, thinking medical aid unnecessary, and will not be laid up very long.

At Cayuga on Friday last Mrs. Olive A. Sternaman was found guilty of the murder of her husband, George H. Sternaman, and Mr. Justice Armour sentenced her to be hanged on the 20th of January next.

The most disastrous fire in London, England, since the great conflagration of 1666, broke out on the afternoon of the 19th inst. About 150 warehouses and their contents were wholly or partially destroyed, and the loss is estimated at \$25,000,000. A hundred engines played upon the flames, and a thousand policemen kept the crowd in order. No body was seriously hurt.
