The Pope's Encyclical.

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—(Special.)—The encyclical of his Holiness the Pope in reference to education in Manitoba was not published in Rome until Saturday, so that the summary cabled by the Associated Press on Friday was a forecast rather than a condensation of what was actually known. It bears out fully what was stated in this correspondence on Friday evening, that the Pope advises the acceptance by the Catholics of Manitoba of the concessions embodied in what is known as the Manitoba school settlement, while claiming at the same time that these concessions are inadequate, and expressing the hope that full satisfaction may be obtained from the Manitoba Legislature. At the same time his Holiness reminds the Catholics of Manitoba that they had been deficient in providing for the education of Catholic children. The following is a reliable and intelligent cabled summary of the document:—After speaking in praise of Canada and of the Bishops, it treats of the law of 1890, and condemns what was then done. It lays down principles of Catholic education and speaks of the rights of parents. The Bishops are praised for resisting the law of 1890. The Pope recognizes the fact that something was done to remedy the law of 1890, and says that the Manitoba Government was inspired with a love of justice and praiseworthy intention in the decisions they arrived at. He says that the law made to remedy the evil is defective, imperfect and insufficient. The Catholics demand, and have the right to demand, much more, as the arrangements made may fail of effect owing to local circumstances. Enough had not been done in Manitoba for Catholic education. The Bishops must aim at having justice done, and must pursue the object with zeal and prudence. There must not be discord, yet as the object does not impose a line of conduct determinate and conclusive, but, on the contrary, admits of several, as is usual in such matters, it follows that there may be, on the lines to be followed, a certain number of opinions equally good and acceptable. Let none then lose sight of this rule of moderation, gentleness and brotherly love. Let none forget the respect due to his neighbor, but let all weigh the circumstances, determine what is best to be done, and do it in agreement and not without consultation with the Bishops. As regards particularly the Catholics of Manitoba, the Pope expresses his confidence that, God helping, they will win and obtain full satisfaction. This confidence is founded above all on the goodness of their cause, next on the justice and wisdom of those who govern, and lastly on the good-will of all Canadians. In the meantime, and until they succeed in their claims, let them not refuse partial satisfaction. Especially wherever the law or circumstances, or good disposition of the people, offer some means of lessening the evil and warding off more danger, it is absolutely expedient and advantageous that they should make

use of them and derive from them all possible benefit. Wherever, on the contrary, there is no other remedy, Catholics are exhorted to liberality. The Pope speaks of the necessity of highly-trained teachers for Catholic schools, and finally warns the press to be decorous and not personal. It is to be noticed that in this document Leo XIII. breathes the spirit of the age and enjoins an observance of the constitutional usage which is characteristic of his enlightened policy. He practically condemns the dictatorial attitude of the majority of Bishops in Quebec, and takes the more liberal view that Catholics are free to choose and to act. There does not appear to be a single word in the encyclical against the Public Schools of Canada, and in proof that his Holiness considers Federal intervention at an end, there is not a word from which to infer that the Catholics are to look to Ottawa to obtain that full measure of justice which it may be contended was not accomplished by the concessions of the settlement.

A Formidable Ministry.

The cares of the Premiership have not robbed Mr. Hardy's hand of its cunning; he has laid down at this final session of the Assembly a strong, solid platform upon which to make the fight for return to power.

First, the Ministry congratulated Ontario upon the improvement in the times, and the prospect of abundant prosperity.

Then came the recital of the Mowat Cabinet's long and clean record.

Next there was a defence of the present Government's record, in which many charges were explained away to the eminent satisfaction of its followers, and which put the Opposition pretty much, with the country, where it was before Mr. Whitney's promising tour.

Then the Government proceeded to lay its platform for the fray.

A bill to prevent gambling at fairs was introduced—a necessary and beneficent measure.

Then came another beneficent bill, the measure to stamp out the San Jose scale.

The steps to be taken to preserve and renew the forests constitute another praiseworthy act.

Then came the budget speech, with profits of Ontario's business for the year and the surplus.

Then the desirable changes in the mining law.

And, finally, a strong, patriotic timber policy, sure to become popular with the people, especially in Western Ontario.

Unquestionably the Liberals may go home happy for their Christmas holidays. The Cabinet has made a strong bid for a renewal of the people's confidence. Mr. Whitney and his supporters have a big task on hand, to assail and defeat a Government so well entrenched and with so many beneficial measures proposed on the eve of the campaign.—Toronto Star.

Eight barges loaded with gunpowder, falsely labelled "Arms," have been seized by the customs officers in the Thames. They emanated from Russia, and were about to be transferred to the steamer Baluchistan for Persia. It is suggested that the ammunition was destined for the Afridis.

Recently the Foreign Secretary received a number of poisoned arrows from Uganda. They have been sent to the Royal College of Physicians, with a request that they should be carefully examined and a report made as to the character of the poison and the possibility of antidotes being used against it.

A juror in Worcester recently asked to be excused on account of deafness. The judge refused, and he sat patiently through a trial lasting several hours. At its close the other eleven jurors were for conviction, but he voted persistently for acquittal on the ground that, as he could not hear the testimony, he could not vote for conviction.

Thomas Edwin Cook, who, when in his prime, was a leading circus clown, is dead at his home at Peterson, N. J. He was ninety-six years old. Cook was born at Beck's Hills, England, and in 1826 came to this country with his father's circus, said to have been the first to exhibit in America. Young Cook was attached to the circus as a tumbler, but later became a clown, which line he followed until 1897. He has nearly one hundred descendants, the majority of whom have taken either to the circus or the stage. Pneumonia is given as the cause of his death.
