**Racehorse vs. Millionaire.**

The greatest animal money winner in the world is an Irish race horse named Galtee More.

In a bare fraction over 18 minutes and 9 seconds he has earned the enormous sum of \$113,185.

This is at the rate of \$104 per second. Now, calculating two jumps for every second of time, Galtee More has earned \$53 for every jump he has taken on the English turf this year.

This, of course, does not include the Cambridgeshire Stakes, where the great English thoroughbred came in a loser.

**WHAT JOHN ROCKEFELLER MAKES.**  
Income, per year.....\$18,000,000.00  
Income, per day.....49,320.00  
Income, per hour.....2,055.00  
Income, per minute.....34.25  
Income, per second.....0.57

Our greatest money magnate is said to be John D. Rockefeller, the Standard Oil King. The popular estimate of Mr. Rockefeller's wealth is \$200,000,000 today, but it is probable that he cannot estimate within many millions of the property he actually owns.

On any basis, Mr. Rockefeller must be making these days about \$18,000,000 per year. Of this stupendous sum Mr. Rockefeller receives about \$50,000 a day.

The fact that some of Mr. Rockefeller's employees receive only \$1 per day has nothing to do with this story or with the earnings of Galtee More.

Galtee More stands pre-eminently at the head of the world's money winners. Mr. Rockefeller individually stands second, and some of Mr. Rockefeller's employees stand very nearly last.

But what a pigmy Mr. Rockefeller would be in the financial line if Galtee More could run steadily for a year at eight hours a day, and earn money accordingly.

The very first jump down the long course would mean \$52, and thereafter the money would roll in so rapidly that it would employ many men to keep count of it.

In a minute the Irish flyer would have earned over \$6,000. In an hour he would have earned an independent fortune—over a quarter of a million dollars.

In a week his owner would be a multi-millionaire to an extent that it tires the mind to think of.

In the same length of time \$345,240 would have fallen into John D. Rockefeller's coffers.

In two days Galtee More would almost equal Rockefeller's income for a year. In a month the swift thoroughbred would far surpass the principal of Mr. Rockefeller's fortune.

In a year, when the Irish champion should pass weary and panting under the wire, he would have earned \$1,093,248,000. Think of it.

But what would Galtee More care for this wealth of a kingdom? Not so much as he would care for a half-gallon measure of oats, and far less than he would care for a romp over green pastures with his fellows.

But Galtee More will finally die and go to the heaven of good horses, while the wealth of John D. Rockefeller will roll on, night and day, year by year, until the time may come when the United States cannot go to war without the oil millionaire's consent.

Galtee More works for his money, and

by all the laws of equitable competition he is entitled to it.  
Rockefeller does not work nearly so hard per minute for his income, and therein he has the better of it.

**Sausage in the Park.**

Mr. St. John is doing his level best not only to raise the Humber hogger to the dignity of a political issue, but is providing highly diverting reading matter for the great and intelligent public, and demonstrating the wisdom of the Hebrew prejudice against pork. If the entertainment continue much longer, it will become as amusing as the Lutger trial, and the name of the big representative of West York will speedily become as much a household word as that of the burly sausage maker at Chicago. Mr. St. John, however, is missing a great and glorious opportunity to acquire undying fame, not only as a man with a fine nose for scandal, but as a masterly manipulator of men and evidence. He might lug into the Assembly rooms the carcass of a choleraic hog, and by ocular illustration demonstrate to the utter satisfaction of his fellow-legislators the gravity of his charges. A huge porker with one side and part of the neck decayed to a rich green tint would make a most effective exhibit, and, to render it still more so, Mr. St. John might even carve off the tainted portion, produce a sausage machine, and manufacture a few pounds for the delectation of his colleagues. What an effective argument a stomachful of diseased sausage manufactured before their own eyes would be, especially if the stalwart legal sausage grinder were to put in the femur as exhibit B and present the tail, snout and feet as proof that the carcass was neither that of the coughing calf nor the lodge-room goat. Moreover, if Mr. St. John wishes to do his friends at Ottawa a good turn and give the Federal Government the knife where the butcher gave it to the pig, he could prove that the Humber hogs were corn-fed, and, therefore, bound to be of a poorer quality than the pea fed animals that Mr. St. John would raise if he were the agricultural autocrat of the Ontario Ministry. On the whole, he is missing the opportunity of his life.—*Toronto Star.*

**Beet-Root Sugar.**

The promoters of the proposed beet-root sugar factory at Owen Sound say: "We now import all the sugar we use, 400,000,000 lbs. (three-quarters of this is beet sugar) costing about \$12,000,000 per year. The greater part comes from Germany's four hundred factories, and we pay for it all in hard cash. We send our cheese, butter, beef and mutton to England and send the money we get for them to Germany for sugar that we can grow and make as well at home, and keep our money here. Our beets are fully as rich in sugar as the German's, and we maintain that we Canadians are as intelligent as the people of any other country. Then why should we allow the Germans to grow and boil twelve million dollars' worth of beets into sugar for us?"

In view of these conditions, it is to be hoped that the beet root sugar factory at Owen Sound will soon be established, and that before long Canada will not need to import any sugar.

Dr. Wiley, chief chemist of the United States Department of Agriculture, in an address before the Broome, N. Y., county farmers at Binghamton last week, stated that he was certain the time has come when the United States will arrange to produce its own sugar. He said that one million acres of beets properly cultivated will produce enough sugar to supply the country. Such an industry in Canada would be of "double-headed" advantage to Canadian farmers.—*Ottawa Citizen.*

What promises to be the largest influx of settlers that has ever taken place to this country from the States, will arrive in the spring, at which time the Rev. R. A. Burris, of Bowmanville, Ont., will bring in over 100 families with their effects. Unlike the majority of immigrants, the people coming are all well-to-do, and will bring, in addition to about \$200,000 cash, several carloads of stock and personal and household effects. In order to facilitate the placing of this large body of settlers, the Crown Lands Department has agreed to set apart a township or more on Rainy River, back of Emo, where the newcomers can obtain first-class land for homesteads.
