School Board Proceedings.

Fenelon Falls, Dec. 28th 1897. Board met at the call of the chairman. All the members present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Heard, That Miss Bellingham be re-engaged for the term ending June 30th at a salary of \$225 per annum.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the chairman be instructed to have the 2-foot dry hardwood at the north ward school removed to the south ward school, and procure a temporary supply of 4-foot wood for the north ward school.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Heard, That the chairman, Mr. T. Austin and Mr. Littleton be a committee to make arrangements for the procuring of storm windows for the north ward school.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. T. Austin, That this board ask for tenders for caretakers for the schools during the ensuing year, the duties to be defined as follows:—(1.) The floors to be carefully swept every evening, and all forms, tables, etc., to be dusted next morning before school opens. (2.) The floors to be well scrubbed during each holiday term, viz., at Christmas, Easter and in August; and all the seats, forms, tables and wood work also to be washed at the same time. (3.) Regarding the north ward school, that the fire be kindled on Monday morning at 6 30 o'clock, and other mornings not later than 7 o'clock. (4.) Fires to be kindled in the south ward school at 7 o'clock a. m. (5.) To keep snow cleaned off all walks in front and rear of buildings, and look after the general order, etc. (6.) Caretaker to remain at school room until after ringing the first bell.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Heard, That the retiring chairman, Mr. F. McDougall, be re-elected for the ensuing year, and that the thanks of the board be tendered to him for the able and efficient manner in which he filled that position.—Carried.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the following accounts be paid and the chairman give his orders for the same: F. McDougall, paid Hilyer for 3 cords of wood, \$4 50; E. Lausfield, carting \$1.25; E. D. Hand, printing, \$1; H. Puley, account for brick, etc., \$12.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the secretary notify the caretakers of the acceptance of their tenders; Miss Bell at a salary of \$65 and Mrs. Deyman \$45 for the ensuing year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Mr. Littleton, That the secretary be instructed to ask for tenders for fifteen cords of 4-foot body maple and beech to be delivered at the north ward school, and — cords of 2-foot body maple and beech to be delivered at the south ward school.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Heard, That this school board meet on the third Tuesday of each month for the year 1898.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the treasurer's securities, viz., Wm. Junkin and Mrs. Ellery, be accepted by this board for the ensuing year.—Carried.

Fenelon Council.

Cameron, January 10th, 1898. The following gentlemen took the declarations of qualification and office: J. Daniel reeve, Alexander McGee deputy-reeve, Taylor Parkin, Peter Perdue and R. C. Webster councillors.

Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. Communications from R. J. McLaughlin, The Times Printing Co., D. Egelson, C. B. Taylor, T. Wood and several accounts were read.

Moved by Mr. McGee, seconded by Mr. Perdue, That the expenditures made by the commissioners appointed to erect the piers of Rosedale bridge and to fill in and grade the approach and furnish material therefor be confirmed, also that the over-expenditure of \$10 on con. 4 at lot 20 by Mr. R. C. Webster and an order by the ex-reeve in favor of Mr. H. Hartle for \$5 for ditching on quarter line between lots 5 and 6, con. 3, be confirmed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by

Mr. McGee, That the motion passed at the last meeting of council authorizing Mr. Taylor Parkin to expend \$12 in opening a winter road across lots 2 and 3, con. 4, be rescinded as Mr. Parkin reports that it is undesirable to make the said road at present.—Carried.

Mr. Hugh O'Leary addressed the council with regard to the Sturgeon Point road dispute.

Moved by Mr. Parkin, seconded by Mr. Webster, That the reeve issue an order in favor of Mrs. Robert Burton for \$3, to pay her fare and expenses from Toronto Hospital.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by Mr. Parkin, That the reeve is hereby instructed to lay before the County Council our claims re Rosedale bridge, and that the clerk is hereby instructed to submit to the County clerk, for presentation to the County Council at its next session, a detailed statement of the expenditures of the municipality in the erection of the said bridge, piers and approaches thereto.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Parkin, seconded by Mr. Webster, That Mary McFayden and Sarah McFayden receive \$5 each out of the poor rate.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McGee, seconded by Mr. Webster, That Mr. Thomas Horton receive a grant of \$10 on account of his long isolation by diphtheria.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Parkin, seconded by Mr. Webster, and resolved, That John E. Fital is hereby re-appointed collector of the unpaid taxes on the roll of 1897, without increase of salary, and that the said taxes be collected forthwith; also that the corporate seal be attached to this resolution.

The reeve appointed James Deacon, Esq., as his auditor for 1898.

Moved by Mr. Parkin, seconded by Mr. Webster, That Mr. M. Maybee be appointed auditor for 1898, and that a by-law to confirm this appointment and the appointment by the reeve be received.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by Mr. McGee, That Mr. William Downer be appointed assessor, at a salary of \$60, and that a by-law to confirm this appointment be received.—Carried.

A by-law to confirm the appointment of auditors and an assessor was received and read in committee of the whole, Mr. McGee in the chair.

Moved by Mr. Parkin, seconded by Mr. Webster, That Mr. John T. Palmer is hereby authorized to expend \$25 on the 7th concession, opposite lots 19 to 22 provided that fifteen days' work of man and team be given by the petitioners.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Parkin, seconded by Mr. Webster, That the collector be allowed an abatement of the taxes charged against Mr. George Rutherford, amounting to \$3 53; also 77c. charged against William Rutherford, as the lands against which said amounts are charged belong to, and are assessed to, Mr. Thomas Cashore.—Carried.

Rev. Mr. Snowden and Mr. Ryan of Cambray addressed the council, asking that something be done with Mr. Edward Fieldhouse, a blind indigent at Cambray, he being unfit to be left alone as heretofore, on account of old age.

Moved by Mr. McGee, seconded by Mr. Webster, That the following bills be paid: D. Tolmie, Wm. Downer, E. G. Lytle, John Kennedy and John T. Palmer, deputy returning officers, \$4 each; Clerk, election expenses, \$6; Cameron Orange Lodge, use of hall to date, \$8; Cambray Orange Lodge, do., \$4; W. Marsh, attending T. Horton's family 42 days during diphtheria isolation, \$30; Loveley Grange, use of hall for election, \$2; S. S. No. 7, use of school house for election, \$2; J. L. Brown, use of house for election, \$4.—Carried.

The council then adjourned to meet at Cambray on the first day of March.

Mrs. Sternsman, sentenced to be hanged on January 20th for the murder of her husband, is to have another trial.

The date of the Provincial elections has not yet been fixed, but they will probably be held within two months from now.

Mrs. Anna Jack, of Farmington, Ill., was taken with a severe coughing spell some time ago, and a lump was ejected which is reported to have been a mass of common pins.

Angus McPherson, a farmer residing a few miles north of Maxville, met with a peculiar death. While eating his dinner a piece of beef, which was not properly masticated, stuck in his throat. He died almost immediately in terrible agony.
