

The Spanish-American War.

There has been no fighting during the past week, but Commodore Dewey has at last been heard from and ful particulars of the battle of Manilla obtained. The modern ships and guns of the Americans gave them such an enormous superiority that, though the engagement lasted only about seven hours, the Spanish fleet, consisting of about fourteen vessels; was almost utterly destroyed. At least 600 Spaniards were either killed or wounded; while not a man was killed on any of the American ships and only half a dozen wounded. A battle between Admiral Sampson's fleet and the Spanish fleet that left the Cape de Verde islands was expected to take place this week; but the latest news is that the Spaniards- have gone back to Cadiz, thus shirking an engagement that must inevitably end in their destruction.

Culverwell and White-Fraser were unknown in the Falls, except, possibly, to three or four persons; but on Monday night a by-law was passed authorizing them to erect poles and string wires for the transmission to Lindsay, in the shape of electricity, of more than half of the power of our magnificent waterfall. The proposal to pass such a by-law would probably never have been entertained if it had not happened to suit Messrs. McDougall, Brandon & Austin, who form what is known as the village syndicate, and who, as leading members of the community, naturally have considerable influence. A few years ago they bought part of the water power from the executors of the Smith estate; exactly how much we do not know, and | Wm. Udy it does not matter; but a great deal more than is needed to run their large flour and grist mill and the dynamo that supplies the streets, stores and other buildings in the village with electric light. Being willing to dispose of their surplus water power and the electric light plant, and Messrs. Culverwell and White Fraser offering to buy it provided the by-law were passed, Messrs. McDougall, Brandon & Austin favored the course they thought best for their own interests, and we don't know that anybody blames them. But we think it is no exaggeration to say that ninety per cent of the rest of the population of the village are opposed to the by-law, and on Monday morning a petition was drawn up, signed during the day by 129 ratepayers, and at night was laid before

use; every member of the council exagainst the by-law, had gone there with a determination, as one of them expressed it, to "shove it through," and it was shoved through accordingly. We may remark that the by-law was not the one that appeared in last week's Gizette, but another, drawn up by Mr. Me-Laughlin, the village solicitor, who was present at the meeting. As it had been asserted that many of the signers of the petition were not ratepayers, we decided to publish it; but the clerk was forbidden to let us have it, on the ground, Councillor Clark said, that many whose names had appeared thereon had," apologised " for signing it. But it liappened that a copy of the heading had been kept by the person who drew it up, and here it it, with, we believe, a correct list of the names of the petitioners :

TOTHE REEVE AND COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE

OF FENELON FALLS. The petition of the undersigned ratepayers of Fenelon Falls humbly shewethe:

1. That they are credibly informed that it is the intention of your honorable body to pass a by-law giving a certain party or parties power to erect poles, wires, and all other necessary appliances within the limits of the Corporation for the purpose of conveying the motive power engendered by the falls on the river, to be used in other places outside of and at a distance from the village.

3. That we are credibly informed that in consideration of the above grant the said party or parties covenant to leave 350 horse power to be utilized by any parties who may erect and operate factories at a yearly rental of \$10 per horse power for a day of: 12 hours.

3. That the saw mill' now-operated bythe Bank of Toronto on the south side of the river makes use of 400 horse power of the water, which at the above rate would amount to a rental of \$8,000 per annumnar amount which would effectually debar any other industries from coming to the village.

4. We submit that the passing of any such by-law will be a permanent injury to the trade of the village.

5. Your petitioners therefore pray that you will refrain from passing any such bylaw, but, on the contrary, will use your best efforts to retain our magnificent water power for the use of factories either within the limits of the corporation or its immediate vicinity.

And your petitioners will ever pray. Dated at Fenelon Falls 9th May, 1898.

Willage Council Proceedings.

Fenelon Falls, April 30th, 1898. Council met at the call of the reeve; all the members present except reeve

Mr. Culverwell waited on the council in regard to placing poles and wires on the streets of the village for electric-

The reeve entered and took his seat. Moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Austin, That the council adjourn. until Thursday, May 5th .- Carried.

Fenelon Falls, May 5th, 1898. Council met pursuant to adjournment; all the members present.

Messrs. Culverwell and White-Fraser asked permission of the council to erect: poles and wires for the transmission of: electric light, power, etc. agreeing to retain one sixth of the horse-power for use in the village.

Considerable discussion was taken part in by the members of the council, Mr. F. McDougall, Messrs, Culverwell. and White Fraser, and R. J. McLaughlin, village solicitor, Mr. Slater, Mr. Davey, Mr. Campbell and others.

Mr. McKeown gives notice that att the next meeting of the council he will introduce a by-law for permitting the proposed Hight, Heat & Power Co., to be promoted by Messrs. Culverwell & White-Fraser, the privilege of using the streets and public places for conveying electric power, etc., subject to the provisions that three hundred and fifty (350) horse power be retained and available for local purposes at ten dollars (\$10) per horse power per annum of four thousand, three hundred and eighty (4,380) hours-at the wheel, and free sites for manufacturing industries, and for the continued operation of electric light works for the use of the village. and citizens, at rates not higher than at . present, and that such proposed company will pay two-thirds (2) of any reasenable expense of any advertising or other efforts that may be decided upon by the council for the purpose of inducing industries to locate here.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. McKeown, That the solicitor be instructed to prepare a by-law in accordance with the above notice, with all? the provisions he may think proper to insert, and that the same be introduced and passed at the next regular meeting.

-Carried, Mr. Martin voting nay. Council adjourned.

Fenelon Falls, May 9th, 1898. Regular meeting of council. Members all present except councillor Clark. Minutes of last regular meeting and two special meetings read and approved. Councillor Clark entered and took his seat.

Tenders from John A. Ellis, A. A. Wright and Austin & Craig for lumber and timber were laid on the table.

Moved by Mr. McKeown, seconded by Mr. Austin, That E. D. Hand's bill for printing, \$25, be paid, and the reeve give-his-order for the same. - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Martin, seconded by Mr. McKeown, That this council accept John A. Ellis's tender for plank and cedar for sidewalks at the following prices : Pine \$10, hemlock \$8, cedar \$10 per thousand, delivered to any part of the village, subject to inspection .-Carried.

By law No. -, a by-law to authorize the placing of poles, wires, etc., for the purpose of distributing electricity in the village of Fenelon Falls and transmitting the same to the town of Lindsay and other places, introduced and read a first time. By-law read a second time in committee of the whole, clause by clause, Mr. McKeown in the chair.

Petition from Wm. McArthur and 128 others, praying that the by-law be not passed, laid on the table by Mr. James Dickson, and supported by Mr. John McSweyn. A great deal of discussion by most of the leading ratepayers was taken part in and some amendments made in the by-law.
