The *Dawn* and palace barge *Chemong* ran an excursion to Cobocook, where there were great doings, and the crowd there was swelled by a large party brought from Valentin and other points by the *Alice Ethel*, which had the Queen's Own pipe-band from Lindsay on board. It is to be hoped that next year we shall have a celebration of our own at the Falls, and not be compelled to stay at home doing nothing or spend the day elsewhere.
