The War Probably Ended.

It is said that overtures for peace have been made by the Spanish Government to the Government of the United States, and that the war is practically at an end; but considerable time is likely to clapse before affairs will be as they were before the outbreak of hostilities. The London (Eng.) Saturday Review predicts a war of extermination between the Cubans and the Americans on the island, and the momentous question as to the possession of the Phillippines is to be settled.
