Uncle Sam Has Forgotten.

When Uncle Sam was bullying the
Don and was about starting in to trim
the gay Spaniard of his colonial posses-
sions, John Bull stood by and kept off
the rest of Europe. Britain insisted
that the United States should have fair
play and a free hand, and prevented
the European interference which would
otherwise certainly have saved Spain
and humiliated the United States. Be-
cause of this very substantial assistance,
the United States went into raptures
over Great Britain, talked of a formal
alliance and swore undying friendship.
But where is that friendship now when
Britain stands alone and faces France
and Russia? When the United States
began preparations for war, British
public men, British statesmen and the
British press were aglow with praise
and justification of the republic. But
now, when Britain is assembling its
fleet and preparing for the fray, against
incalculably greater odds than the Uni-
ted States had to face, where is the moral
support, endorsement and praise which she
has the right to expect from the republic?
Where now are all the warm
speeches, the glowing editorials, the
sermons, the pulpit prayers that should
be ringing through the United States,
notifying Europe that if need be the
Stars and Stripes would be raised be-
side the Union Jack? Prophecies have
been fulfilled. The cold fact is that
the United States, eternally selfish and
self-seeking, has forgotten all about the
great debt it owes to Britain, or, if it
hasn't forgotten, it hasn't the slightest
intention of putting itself to the trouble
of paying. The Statesmen are too much
engrossed in the corrupt state elections,
too busy obeying the behests of bosses
to obey the impulses of gratitude.—To-
ronto Star.

Education.

We quoted the other day the remarks
of Mr. D. R. Wilkie, at the annual
meeting of the Canadian Bankers' As-
sociation, on the subject of Public

School education. The opinion he ex-
pressed was endorsed by another emi-
nent banker, Mr. Byron E. Walker,
President of the Bank of Commerce,
who said on the question of inducing
bank clerks to take up the science of
banking, that "the difficulty was with
the education of the Canadian youth.
The usual High School graduate who
applied for a position in his bank, he
had found, could not pass an examina-
tion in the three r's. Boys were turned
out of the High School as poorly equip-
ped for their duties in life as they could
be. The boys turned out from the
parish schools of England and the
Scottish schools were better educated."

"Flaneur," in the Toronto Mail and
Empire, alluding to the opinions of
these two leading bankers, says: "It
is to be hoped this plain speaking will
do good. People who, as a rule, know
nothing about educational systems else-
where, have for so long been talking of
the educational system of Ontario be-
ing the best in the world that many of
us have come to believe it. Just the
reverse is the case; I will not say it is
the worst, but it is near it—very near
it." Some day the people of Ontario
will wake up to a realization of the de-
cadence of their Public School system
since Ezerton Ryerson's time, when it
actually was the best in the world. He
was a practical man, and his system was
meant for practical people; the system
of the present day is that of a theorist
who thinks every boy, whatever his
natural ability, must have a university
education—otherwise that boy's life
will be a failure. The result of the
Ross system is just what might have
been expected: the professions are ter-
ribly over-crowded, while thousands of
acres of vacant land in the Northwest,
and even in Ontario, lie waiting for
profitable tillage.—Kingston News.

Wronged By Their So-Called Friends.

All the injuries which may have been
inflicted on innocent officials in the Yu-
kon are due first to the weakness of the
Minister who permitted public servants
to stake out gold claims in competition
with miners, and second on the Ontario
Liberal papers which insisted on slan-
dering every miner who dared to criti-
cise the officials. If the Minister of
the Interior had embodied William
Ogilvie's example in a precept for the
guidance of the other officials, the coun-
try could have believed that the officials
were entirely disinterested. The rules
of the department should have prevent-
ed the officials from becoming claim
grabbers. But in allowing men who
are in the Yukon, at the country's ex-
pense, to beat out men who are in the
Yukon at their own expense, the Min-
ister of the Interior permitted a selfish
motive to become a possible influence
upon the actions of the officials. And
there would have been no continued
outcry against the officials if an inquiry
had been ordered into the charges at
the first whisper of wrong-doing. The
Liberal papers seem to have been in a
conspiracy to throttle every demand for
enquiry. They can whine about the
suffering relatives of poor maligned
Yukon officials, but how about the suf-
fering relatives of Yukon miners?
There are men and women in Ontario
with brothers or husbands in the Yukon,
who know from letters received that
these brothers and husbands have griev-
ances against officials. These people
must allow the Liberal press of Ontario
to call their kinsmen "liars" and "Yan-
kees" and "gamblers" for the high
crime or misdemeanour of telling what
they believe to be the truth about the
work of party nominees in the Yukon.
—Telegram.

There is a social reformer in St.
Louis who advocates the purification
