A LINDSAY MAN KILLED—Two firemen were killed and two engineers were seriously injured by a head-on collision between a Chicago flier and a light engine near Merriton on Saturday. One of the firemen was Abraham Desautel, whose parents live in Lindsay, where he formerly resided, and where he was buried on Tuesday. He was 22 years old and leaves a wife, but no children. The passengers on the train got a bad shaking up, but were not injured.

BROKE THROUGH—On Monday forenoon, while Mr. William Perdue, of Fenelon, was driving across Cameron lake to the Falls one of his horses broke through the ice near Dhill's Point; but, fortunately, the ice under the other one did not give way, and it dragged its companion out. The sleigh, which contained a few bags of grain, was nearly filled with water, and Mr. Perdue got a wetting. He says he was driving on the main track, which ought to be shifted farther from the Point, near which, owing to a current, the ice is always thinner than elsewhere, and several accidents—though, as far as we remember, no fatal ones—have happened in its vicinity.

WE HOPE IT'S TRUE—One of our villagers informs us that, while he was on his way to Kinmount by train, a few days ago, he heard a passenger tell another that the lumbering firm of McCormick & McLeod, of —, were making preparations to build a sawmill at Fenelon Falls, as they had extensive timber limits away out north, and the Falls was the most advantageous point to turn their logs into lumber. Who the passengers were, our informant did not know; but he heard what we have stated, and we can only hope that it may prove true. ACCIDENT—Mr. Henry Smith, of the Falls, met with a serious accident, early on Tuesday morning, at the "dump" near the Chemical Company's sawmill in the township of Somerville. He was showing a teamster where to put a load, and, when the man started his team, his sleigh struck one end of a log and pushed it forward, and Mr. Smith's right leg was caught between the other end of the log and a skid, with the result that one of the bones was broken about four inches above the ankle joint. He was brought home as soon as possible and attended to by Dr.

Graham, who set the bone and placed it in splints, and we are glad to hear from him that his patient is doing well. Much sympathy will be felt for Mr. Smith, as he has, at different times, met with two or three accidents, though none so serious as the one from which he is now suffering, and from the effects of which we hope he will soon recover.

DID N'T FIND WOODVILLE—Something over a week ago a cantata was given at Woodville, 22 miles from here, and a young man, accompanied by his own best girl and somebody else's, drove off in a cutter to hear it; but, instead of reaching Woodville, they found themselves at Cambray, ever so many hours after leaving home.
