CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the Fenelon Falls Gazette:

Sir,
To say that Mr. F. McDougall's reply to my former letter criticising the so-called auditors' report of the School Board for 1901 is disingenuous is putting it mildly. He first mounts his high horse because my communication was anonymous. The question is, are the facts as set forth in my letter? Whether I chose to write over a nom de plume or not is not of the slightest importance. Next, he assumes an air of injured innocence, and we "are actuated by personal ill-will." I can assure Mr. M. that neither he nor any nor all of the party or parties who had a hand in getting up that document is of sufficient importance in the estimation of Ratepayer for him to waste either time or paper for their benefit. Then, he says it would take too much time and space to reply to all my letter. I can sympathize with him in the weight of the contract he would have on his shoulders were he to attempt to explain that Report. With some others who knew less about the actual condition of affairs it might prove a less weighty undertaking. But he will be pleased to discuss everything at a public meeting. Well, Mr. Editor, this proposition would be decidedly cool if it were not so decidedly rich. It would be decidedly rich were it not so decidedly cool. Does he expect that any one is going to the trouble and expense of calling a public meeting to hear him give his reasons for wrong-doing? The whole community is fully alive to the little benefit that would be derived from any such discussion. What I want, and what all the ratepayers of the school section—with the exception of perhaps the small coterie which stands so much in awe of this "Icon" of the School Board—want, is that the school accounts for 1901 be audited by two competent men, two men who, when they take an oath to perform a certain duty, will hold the proper discharge of the duties assumed by the taking of that oath, paramount to all others. And I appeal to the village council, as business men, to have such an audit made without further delay, and not have our corporation put to the humiliation and expense of calling in the services of the Provincial Auditor. For a proper audit the taxpayers must and will have. And here let me whisper to the Board to see to it that they carefully preserve all cash books and vouchers for that year, for the auditors will most likely wish to have them produced, and we may as well understand that such an expressed wish from a Provincial Auditor is tantamount to a command.

I have it on reliable authority that it has not been customary for some years for all school funds to pass directly from the hand of the treasurer to the parties entitled to receive them; but on a number of occasions orders have been given on the chairman of the Board, taken up and paid by him, when we know for a fact that the office of the treasurer was quite as accessible as his. Now, sir, why was this? Did the treasurer, when he received money, pass it over to the chairman for safe keeping, and to pay it out, thus relieving him of responsibility, and leave him nothing to do except draw the salary? Did he and the chairman go "snooks" on the salary, or was it purely a labor of love on the part of the chairman? Perhaps this is none of the public's business, but then, they'd like to know, you know.

It appears there is a brand new treasurer's cash book for 1902. All old things now are passed away. Was the old book full, or is this merely a turning over of a new leaf? I shall not comment on it further than to notice that whoever kept it has rather overshot the mark. I should like to see a statutory declaration made by some responsible person that all the entries in it were made on the dates that the occurrences are alleged to have taken place; that all entries therein were not made on one day, and that day less than four weeks prior to this date; that all entries were not made with ink out of the same bottle, by the same pen, held in the same hand, and that that hand was the hand of the School Treasurer.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made by the Canada Central Railway Company to the Parliament of Canada at the next session thereof for an act giving the said Company power to construct and operate the following lines from or in connection with the main line of the said Railway:—

1. From some point at or near Sudbury, in the Province of Ontario, to a point at or near Scotin Junction; thence southerly to some point at or near Balsam or Sturgeon Lakes in the townships of Bexley, Verulam or Fenelon, continuing southerly to the City of Toronto.

2. From some point on the main line in the district of Keewatin or in the district of Saskatchewan to Port Churchill on Hudson Bay.

3. A continuation of its main line from Tete Juan Cache by way of the Thompson and Frazer River valleys to Vancouver or New Westminster.

4. From some point on the Thompson River or some of its tributaries to Waddington Harbor or Butte Inlet.

5. From a point near the old site of Fort Assiniboia to some point on the Peace River and westerly to the Portland Canal on the Pacific.

(6) From some point on the main line of said Railway at or near the Montreal River in the Province of Ontario easterly to some point on the Gatineau River in the Province of Quebec.

And to exercise with regard to such lines all the powers and privileges given to the said Company by its Act of Incorporation. Dated at Toronto this 9th day of December, 1902.
