### Teachers' Convention.

The annual convention of the West Victoria Teachers' Association was held in the Fenelon Falls public school on the 21st and 22nd inst. The convention was well attended, and was one of the best held for some time. Among the speakers from a distance were Mr. Elliot, vice-principal of Toronto Normal School, Mr. Stevens, I. P. S., of Lindsay, and Mr. Lohead, who addressed the convention on the subject of "Phonics." Messrs. Elliot and Stevens' addresses were much appreciated by all who heard them. A well-prepared lesson in literature was taught by Mr. E. Mosgrove, of Kirkfield. Mr. Mitchell, Rev. Mr. Garbutt and Dr. Gould also addressed the meeting. Resolutions of condolence were drawn up and instructions given for them to be forwarded to the relatives of the late Mr. H. Keazin, I. P. S., and the late Mr. B. H. Maybee, for so many years principal of the Fenelon Falls public schools. On the morning of the 22nd Dr. Gould informed the teachers that the reeve and council of the village had engaged a boat to leave the wharf at 12:30 and give the teachers the benefit of a trip up the lakes. The trip was thoroughly enjoyed by about twenty eight teachers.

### School Board.

Fenelon Falls, May 19th, 1903. Board met at regular meeting; all the members present except Mr. Nevison. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Arnold, That, providing fifteen pupils, or more than that number, pass the Entrance Examination this year from this school, this Board will establish the Grade A Continuation Class.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Mason, That the chairman having purchased the corner lot adjoining the south ward school, according to instructions, and the deeds having been made to himself instead of to the school board, he be empowered to have the same made over or conveyed to the school section; and that this board give the chairman an order on the treasurer for two hundred dollars, being the purchase price of the aforesaid lot.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, That the following accounts be paid, and that the chairman give his orders for the same: J. J. Power, piling in wood and cleaning woodshed, \$6; John Chatten, putting in wood last winter, 50c; Harry Robson, school supplies, \$6 75; Charles Keast, planting trees around the new school ground, \$5; George H. McGee, for wire and nails, 60c; George Martin, scantling and posts, \$1 65; Fenelon Falls Star, printing auditors' reports, \$10; Felix Northey, for work at north ward school, \$4; and that the payment of last quarter's salaries be confirmed.—Carried.
