Crop Prospects.

Our farming friends around here are jubilant, and well they may be, for the crop prospects were seldom or never better on the first day of July than they are now. Up to about a month ago the outlook was bad, as there had been three weeks with very little rain and three more with none at all. But at length the "drought," as it was beginning to be called, came to an end, and the frequent rains during June made a wonderful change on the face of nature, as well as on the faces of the farmers, who now tell us that everything is looking splendid, with the single exception of hay, of which, after all, there will be a fair yield, though not as good a one as last year. Something over a month ago the pessimists said there would be no hay at all, but we didn't believe them. It is true that there will be very little clover, which headed out when only a few inches high; but to talk about timothy being "past praying for" six or seven weeks before the time for cutting it was, we thought, nonsense, and so it proved to be. About a week ago a farmer told us that he thought his timothy had grown six inches in three days; and, even if the yield be somewhat below the average, there is so much old hay in the country, and there will be so much straw, that there is no reason to fear a scarcity of fodder. All kinds of grain and roots are growing rapidly, and, if we do not have too much rain and bad harvest weather, the farmers will be as jubilant in the winter as they are now, which will be a good thing for the whole community.

Cameron, June 10th, 1903.
Council met in adjourned Court of

Revision. Minutes of the business of the Court at Glenarm read and approved. There being no further amendments to the roll, it was duly signed by the chairman.

General township business was then taken up and minutes of last meeting read and adopted.

Communications were received from H. Pearu, re compensation for work on road; from W. Stevenson, as to 35c. a rod bonus for wire fence; from Dr. A. Wilson, re isolation and care of P. Beamish, a tuberculosis patient at John Daney's; from S. Hughes, M. P., acknowledging having received and forwarded to Hon. Mr. Blair request from council for a further grant to aid in constructing new short road from Cameron to Lindsay.

On motion of Messrs. Webster and Palmer, W. Stevenson was offered a bonus of 30c. a rod, providing Verulam pay half this amount.

On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Mark, \$25 was granted John Daney to assist him in taking care of the patient.

On motion of Messrs. Webster and Mark, H. Johnston was offered a bonus of 15c. a rod for 30 rods wire fence at lot 16, con. 8.

On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Cragg, John Brokenshire was offered 15c. a rod for 119 rods wire fence at lot 5, con. 2. Amendment by Messrs. Webster and Mark granting him 15c. a rod for 100 rods was declared carried.

On motion of Messrs. Webster and Mark, council offered D. B. McNabb 30c. a rod bonus on wire fence along his lot 9, con. 6.

On motion of Messrs. Cragg and Webster, S. McLean and Jas. Bryans were each granted 15c. a rod for 20 rods wire fence along lot 12, con. 3, and lot 6, con. 6.

On motion of Messrs. Webster and Mark, Reeve Parkin and Councillor Cragg were appointed to meet the Ops. Reeve and Messrs. Brook and Waldon to endeavor to settle the boundary fence question.

On motion of Messrs. Cragg and Palmer, Henry Hartle was granted 25c. a rod for 60 rods wire fence at lot 5, con. 2.

On motion of Messrs. Webster and Mark, the reeve was directed to inspect the bridge at lot 22, con. 5, and rebuild or repair it.

Motion by Messrs. Webster and Mark authorizing payment of the following bills: M. Maybee, work on con. 6, \$7; John Maunder, goods for S. McFadyen, \$2; A. F. Cragg, repairs to grader, \$2.20, working grader, \$9; M. Maybee, hall for meeting, \$2; D. Sinclair, rebuilding Routley's bridge, \$35.

On motion of Messrs. Palmer and Cragg, council adjourned to meet at call of reeve.
