## SHORT LESSONS IN SOCIALISM.

(By William H. Leffingwell.)

(a): It has been seen that all progress  
since the dawn of civilization has been  
a series of class struggles; that the  
present struggle is between the capitalist  
and the worker; and that the interests  
of these two classes are diametrically  
opposed.

(b): That political parties are the  
representatives of class interests, and  
the party which stands for the contin-  
uation of the profit system is essentially  
a capitalistic party, no matter what its  
name may be, or what reforms it may  
propose.

(c): That the profit system must of  
necessity fall.

(d): That the revolution which has  
taken place in production and which  
has greatly increased the product of  
each worker, has been brought about by  
co-operative methods, and that the only  
thing which prevents the worker from  
living in comfort and security, instead  
of his present poverty, is the private  
ownership of the means of production  
and distribution.

### THEREFORE.

The Socialist Party, a party of the  
workingmen, organized strictly on class  
lines, proposes to abolish this system  
before it brings disaster upon the people,  
and institute a co-operative common-  
wealth by the following methods, which  
are the only ones possible:

First: Gain control of the powers of  
government and exercise them in behalf  
of the working class.

Second: Operate all industries col-  
lectively, giving the worker the full  
social value of his product.

The above thing we have learned in  
the four previous lessons. Much more  
could have been said on the subjects  
covered in each lesson, but it was the  
writer's intention to make these lessons  
short and simple.

Now that you have mastered the sub-  
ject, what do you think of Socialism?  
Count the points in its favor, shown in  
the first four lessons:

Lesson No. 1 shows that the Socialist  
movement is evolutionary in character,  
and is based upon a most vital principal  
—the class struggle. That's no idle  
dream nor fanciful theory—it is a fact,  
a cold, stubborn fact.

Lesson No. 2 shows the necessity of  
the workingman breaking away from  
the old capitalistic parties and joining  
a party which has for its purpose the  
abolition of a damnable system under  
which we are living, which causes so  
much misery and poverty. Every vote  
which is cast for any other party (and  
this is not an egotistical boast, but a  
logical conclusion) simply forges another  
link in the fetters which hold the work-  
ingman in bondage.

Lesson No. 3 shows that it is impos-  
sible for the present system to last for  
any great length of time, and that sooner  
or later it will fall. Its doom is certain.  
And there is very great possibility of  
there being bloodshed and internal war,  
brought upon us by the capitalist class,  
through the ignorance of the workers.  
If the people are sufficiently educated  
as to the socialist solution this period of  
disorder may be greatly shortened and  
perhaps prevented altogether. But  
should ignorance prevail, it is hard to  
say how long it will last.

Lesson No. 4 shows that the cause of  
the evils of this system is the private  
ownership of the means of production  
and distribution—the means of life, in  
short, and proves that the only way to  
get rid of the effect is to remove the  
cause.

After carefully considering all these  
things you must certainly come to the  
conclusion that socialism is not only not  
impracticable, but it is inevitable; and  
that it is not only your privilege to vote  
for the Socialist Party but it is your  
duty. It is a duty that you owe to  
your wife and family, and to yourself.  
It is not only your duty to vote right,  
but it is also your duty to do all possible  
to induce others to do likewise; for  
should the crisis come before the people,  
or at least a very large majority of them,  
thoroughly understand that the only  
possible remedy is Socialism, the vas-  
army of unemployed, starving work-  
men are liable to cause a good deal of  
damage—perhaps provoke a bloody  
internal war. You can help the Social-  
ists to solve to matter peaceably.

The very best way to help bring  
Socialism is by the united efforts of  
thousands; ergo: join the party; find  
out where there is a branch in your  
neighborhood, and join it at once. If  
every man who votes the ticket, even  
now, should join the party organization  
and work in harmony with his comrades,  
Socialism would be very near at hand.

### Vote to Own the World.

Say, you workingman! Lend me  
that sunburned ear of yours for about  
two minutes. You work for that house  
you live in? for the clothes you wear?  
for the food you eat? for the other little  
enjoyments you get? The work of you  
working people creates all of them, eh?  
Well, does n't your work create all the  
things the rich have also? Why do  
you want to produce all you get, and  
then produce enough for the rich to  
squander? Do n't you build the small  
houses that you occupy, and then build  
palaces for your masters? What do  
you want to do it for? Why not live  
in the best house your labor and skill  
enable you to build? Is it because you  
do n't want to live well, or because you  
do n't know how to get what your labor  
produces? If the latter, do you think  
you will ever know, as long as you list-  
en to the advice of the men who have  
been in control for years? If they know  
and wanted to tell you, you are mighty  
stupid or you would have learned. If  
they know and have n't told you, do you  
think they ever will? Do n't you know  
they want to keep you ignorant, so that  
they may continue to skin you out of a  
good living? They are not the ones to  
be dissatisfied with the existing condi-  
tions. You are the ones that should de-  
sire a change. Join the Socialist party,  
attend its meetings and study its books,  
and you will soon find out you have  
been skinned and how to prevent it.  
Do n't wait for Rockefeller or Morgan  
to teach you how to avoid their skin-  
ning you.—Wayland.

### WHITE SLAVES CHEAP.

Two hundred miners are dead in  
Mark Hanna's coal mine near Cheyenne,  
Wyo. It may never be known how the  
explosion occurred. Had these men  
been chattel slaves they would have  
represented a loss to the owner of at  
least \$300,000. As it is, the loss will  
be only the repairs to the mine. Do  
you wonder that chattel slavery was  
abolished? Can you not see that wage  
slavery is more profitable to the masters?  
Why, even if a mine mule dies the  
masters have to buy another, but when  
one of their men dies there are other  
men ready to step into their places with-  
out a cent's cost to the masters. Men,  
have you so little brains that you cannot  
see the point? Join the Socialist party  
and vote to own the earth and the ful-  
ness thereof yourselves, and you will  
find that that thousands of dollars will  
be spent, if necessary, to make safe the  
life of a single worker. They will not  
have to work under dangerous condi-  
tions, if any amount of money will  
make it safe. If the mines were pub-  
lic property, every widow and orphan  
would be cared for by the public; as it  
is, they can starve and die for all the
