Just now his enthusiastic hope for the final success of the efforts being put forth to induce the County Council to guarantee Fenelon Falls bonds is beautiful to witness, and there is warrant for his hopefulness." Why should the County Council not guarantee our bonds? They are as good as the bonds of the county itself; but "red tape"—which in this case means the rules of the money market—requires the guarantee, which will save the village about \$250 a year for thirty years in interest, and will not cost the county a cent.

ANOTHER HOUSE.—Mr. William Perdue, who retired from farming some time ago and came to the Falls, is about to build a neat residence on Fidler's Hill, and has let the contract to Mr. Geo. H. Littleton. The lot, which was purchased from Mr. Edward Fitzgerald, contains half an acre, and the soil, a sandy loam, is first class for gardening purposes. The house, which will cost about a thousand dollars, is to be the same size as, and closely resemble, those recently built by Mr. E. C. Edwards, Mrs. T. H. Robson and Mr. Thomas West. The cellar is dug, and by the time the stone walls are built, we hope Mr. Littleton will have sufficiently recovered from the effects of his recent accident to commence putting up the frame.

Toronto railway earnings on Labor Day totalled \$13,939, exceeding all records. Two hundred and sixty-three thousand seven hundred and ninety-four paying passengers were carried.

The attendance at the Toronto Exhibition on Monday was 87,000, the largest ever known, except in 1896, when 100,000 turned out to try and get a glimpse of Li Hung Chang. On Tuesday there were 67,000, and on Wednesday 50,000. The receipts up to Tuesday night equalled the whole receipts of last year.

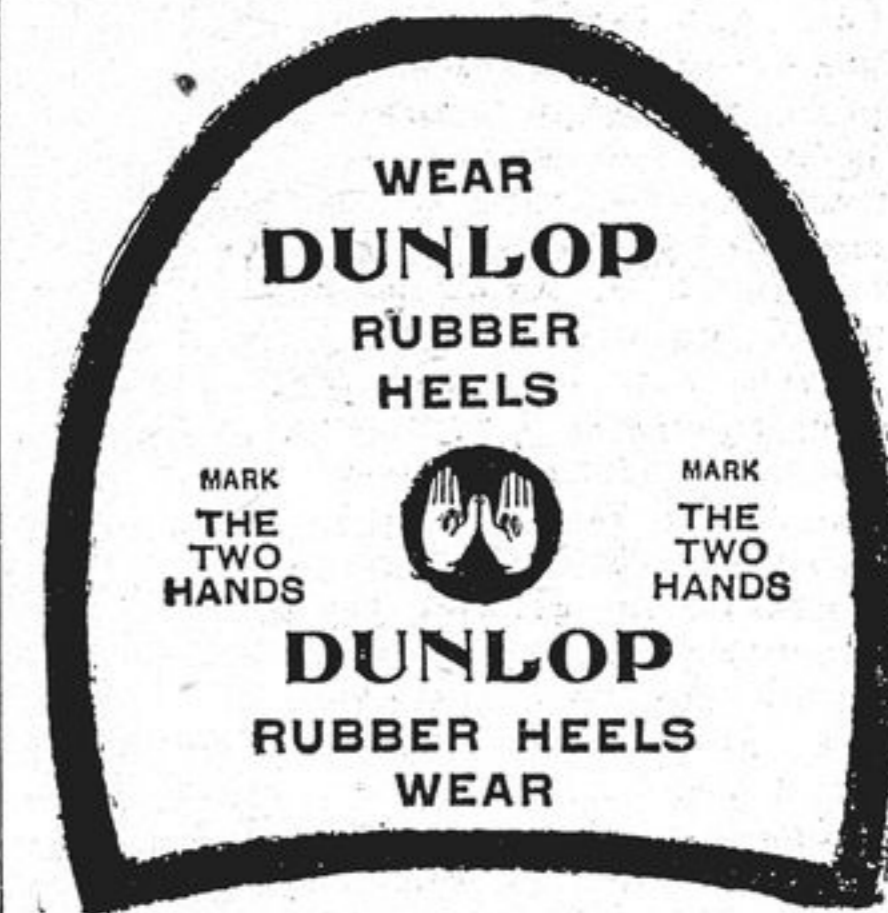
